Perhaps the war issues of liberty bonds served as an eye-opener to many people, who learned from their experiences that there are a great many securities on the market that furnish safe and profitable investment for their idle funds, and a good place for them to keep their "nest eggs."

FOREIGN

Complete control has been assumed by the German government of the distribution of raw materials for refining coal tar. It official circles at Washington the practical socialization in this industry is construed as an attempt of Germany to regain her pre-war supremacy in dyestuffs.

A report to the Department of Commerce says that German-made goods are arriving at Leeds, England, and that dealers are stocking up with them for the Christmas season. The British toy trade will ask their government to stop the German importations.

Denmark has set up machinery to handle trade between Soviet Russia and the world. The plan insures payment for goods, and the Department of Commerce of the United States has the matter under consideration.

The Danish Dairy delegation now in the United States has announced that they wish to import 500,000 pounds of butter a week to this country.

FREIGHT AND PASSENGER TRAIN COSTS

According to a bulletin of the National Coal association the average cost of running a freight train one mile (on the basis of July returns) is \$18.97, while the cost of running a passenger train is \$1.03.
