## NEW PAVEMENT IS OPENED TO TRAFFIC

FINE STRETCH OF ROAD

North Shore Electric Railway to Enlarge Right-of-Way North of Lake Forest

A mile of new brick payement, laid on a concrete base has been completed on the new roadway between Lake Forest and Lake Bluff. The stretch between Noble avenue and Lake Bluff is open to traffic. That part of the road south of Noble avnue will be opened in the near future. This pavement was built by the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee electric railroad to replace the old road which they will take to widen their right-of-way. It is expected that the electric line will construct another track along that part of their road, as it is the only stretch of single track on their line.

The new road has been constructed a few yards east of the old. Within the near future the pavement will be extended south to College road, according to plans being considered.


