TRINITY CHURCH

At the union service in Trinity church on Thanksgiving day the church was crowded by an attentive congregation. The music was inspiring and the Rev. Mr. Pitt preached an excellent and appropriate sermon. The offering was for the Chinese famine sufferers, and the following day Dr. Wolcott sent a draft for \$200 to his son in China for the relief fund. Additional contributions have come in since then and another draft will be forwarded as soon as the amount of the contributions warrants it. Gifts to this fund are invited and all sums will be accounted for by Dr. Wolcott.

At the eleven o'clock service on Advent Sunday in the presence of a large congregation, the beautiful window placed in the church as a memorial to Dumaresq Spencer, was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies. The window pictures the arming of the Christian knight and bears the text "Put on the whole armour of God."

On November 29, there was a celebration of the Holy Communion at 9:30 with special prayers for the Church League of Service after which the ladies held an all day working meeting in the parish house.

Arrangements are almost completed for the parish dinner and entertainment to be held in the parish house on Wednesday, Dec. 8, at seven o'clock p. m. The purpose of the dinner is to bring together the parishoners and to welcome the new families who have come into the parish during the past year. There are between twenty-five and thirty such families.

The first meeting of the discussion group was held in the parish house on Sunday evening, Nov. 28, and was attended by thirty-five men. Mr. Bunell was chairman and Mr. Kneath led the discussion. Much interest was aroused and the group will meet again next Sunday evening. It is desired to have a free discussion of questions connected with the church and its relation to the individual and to society.

The Rev. E. H. Merriman, secretary of the diocese is to preach at the morning service on Sunday, Dec. 12. He will tell of the work of the church in the diocese of Chicago during the past year and of plans for the new year.

The services for next Sunday, December 5, will be as follows: A celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:30 a. m. The Church school will meet at 9:30. A second celebration of the Holy Communion with sermon at 11 o'clock and evening prayer at 5. The mid-week service is on Thursday morning at 9:30.
