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PLEA WAS SELF DEFENSE

Other Items of Interest in the County Seat and Other Cities Told in Paragraphs

Edward Fletcher, negro, who shot and killed Edward Allen a fellow workman, also a negro, at the Vulcan-Louisville Smelting company last spring, was taken last week to Joliet by Sheriff Elvin J. Griffin, to begin serving an indeterminate sentence of from one year to life on a charge of manslaughter. Fletcher's plea was self-defense.

Mrs. Mary Clarke Owens, widow of Patrick Owens, St. Paul railroad detective who was shot to death at Deerfield about 25 years ago, by train robbers, was buried Friday at Calvary cemetery, Chicago. Mrs. Owens was the mother of former county Judge John E. Owens of Chicago.

The Waukegan Sun after making an investigation at various Waukegan bakeries has found that the size of the loaves varies only from 1 pound 7 ounces to 1 pound 10 1/2 ounces.

Two thousand children of Waukegan went to the Northwestern depot Saturday morning to greet Santa Claus, who arrived from the North Pole on the 9:22 o'clock train with a great quantity of toys. "Santa" proved to be an advertisement for one of the stores.

The Zion bank, one of the institutions under the control of Wilbur Glen Voliva, had made application for state supervision, under which it and 500 other private banks throughout the state must come by January 1 as the result of the recent election.

Private William Pike of the army medical corps stationed at Fort Sheridan was convicted of murder by a court martial last Tuesday and sentenced to three years at hard labor at Fort Leavenworth. Pike fatally stabbed Samuel Chessler, another soldier at Fort Sheridan on July 7. He pled self defense.

The gambling lid has been clamped down in Waukegan. Proprietors of gambling houses in the city have been ordered by the police to close. They have been given to understand that any attempt to reopen their places of business will result in raids and arrests. Disclosures that victims of card "sharks" often lose several hundred dollars in games brought the drastic order from the police.

Hypo in the lake water is being blamed for the failure of north shore "home brew" to produce a kick. The hypo, it has been determined, has a tendency to "kill" the yeast the same as it destroys bacteria, and in this way it prevents fermentation. Without fermentation the home brew is "near beer", and not very near at that.

Ambrose Bangs, the son of Justus Bangs, and one of the old settlers in Lake county, died at his home in Wauconda last week. He was born in Stamford, Vermont, Nov. 18, 1831.

Sheriff Green last Wednesday afternoon raided a still at the home of Stanley Bishop, 1419 Victoria street, North Chicago. This was the fourth still raided in four days, and, according to Sheriff Green, it was the largest found up to that time. Bishop was placed under arrest and was taken into police court, where he was arraigned and placed under bonds of \$2,000.
