HORATIO SEYMOUR DIES IN NEW YORK

Father of Mrs. Rex Jones of this
City. Lingering Illness is
Cause of His Death

Horatio Winslow Seymour, who
from 1879 to 1907, was prominently
connected with Chicago newspapers,
died Friday in New York.

Mr. Seymour had been ill for some
time.

Born in Cayuga county, New York,
in 1854, Mr. Seymour came to Chic-
ago from Milwaukee in 1875.

He was one of the best known and
best loved journalists in the west. His
work in Chicago was done on the Chi-
cago Times, on which paper he earned
the reputation of being a particu-
larly alert judge of news. After a
number of years' service with the
Times he became managing editor and
then editor-in-chief of the Chicago
Herald. Associated with James W.
Scott and other brilliant journalists
of that period, he made the Herald
one of the leading papers of the west.

Mr. Seymour was an authority on
tariff with his low tariff editorials
during the campaigns of 1884 and
1892 contributing much to the elec-
tion of Grover Cleveland as president
in those campaigns.

In 1895 he left the Herald to become
publisher of the Chicago Chronicle,
with which paper he remained until
the collapse of John R. Walsh's banks
and other financial interests.

Many newspaper men in Chicago
today acknowledge their indebtedness
to Mr. Seymour for assistance and
encouragement during the early days
of their newspaper experience. Al-
ways of a sympathetic disposition and
disposed to help and advise young re-
porters, he commanded to an unusual
degree the affection and loyalty of the
Herald and Chronicle staffs.

After leaving Chicago Mr. Seymour
became associated with the Pulitzer
newspapers, first in St. Louis and later
in New York. For many years he
has been one of the chief editorial
writers for the New York World.

Mr. Seymour was a son of Andrew
Milliken Seymour. He was educated in
the public schools of Racine, Wis., and
became a printer in the office of the
Racine Advocate and Journal.

Mr. Seymour is the father of Mrs.
Rex Jones of this city. Mr. and Mrs.
Jones went east Saturday to attend
the funeral.

JACOB SCHLEY DIES AT PRAIRIE VIEW

Had Lived in County For 68 Years;
Served for Three Years in
the Civil War

Jacob Schley, a resident of Lake
county for 68 years, died Tuesday at
his home at Prairie View, after an
illness of many years. He was born
in Germany April 13, 1839, and came
to Lake county when 14 years of age.
Fifty-two years ago he was married to
Miss Mary Selig, of Deerfield, twelve
children being born, nine of whom
survive. He is also survived by his
wife and 15 grandchildren. The chil-
dren are:

William Schley, Libertyville; Robert
Edward and Charles Schley, of Prairie
View; Mrs. Mamie Klepper and Mrs.
Martha Baker of Libertyville; Mrs.
Emma Rudolph of Highland Park;
Mrs. Carrie Bohmer of Wauconda and
Fred Schley of Waukegan.

In 1861 Mr. Schley enlisted in the
20th Indiana cavalry and served for
three years and three months.

The funeral service was held at 12
o'clock Friday at the Long Grove
Lutheran church.
