EDGAR RICE BURROUGHS WRITES TO THE LIBRARY

When planning the program for our Children's book week, Miss Ridlon wrote to Mr. Burroughs to ask him to come to Highland Park. She received no reply until the first week of December, and the reply was so characteristic, that every one who reads the Tarzan books and the Mars books will want to read the letter: "Tarzana Ranch, Van Nuys, Calif., December 1, 1920

Dear Miss Ridlon.

I cannot tell you how badly I felt when I received your letter of October 18th only just yesterday. Why it was so terribly delayed I cannot imagine. They have my forwarding address in Oak Park, where I formerly lived, and as far as I know there has never been any delay in sending on letters to me addressed to Oak Park. I am enclosing herewith the envelope in which your letter came that you may see that it was remailed out of Chicago on November 24th, having been held over a month.

"I do not know what you must have thought of my seeming indifference to your very courteous invitation to speak to your children during the Children's Book Week. Of course, I could not have availed myself of this pleasure since I live too far away, but I might at least have sent them a little note to let them know that I thought of them and wish them well, and would like to have been with them.
