CONTINUATION SCHOOLS

Fifteen cities in Illinois have voted to establish part time schools in January 1921 for children in employment between the ages of 14 and 16 years of age. These cities have taken advantage of the "optional mandatory" law which makes eight hours a week of contination school education compulsory on all young people of Highland Park ever inaugurated and it deserves the enlarge number of young people who enter these schools have finished not more than five or six grades in the grammar school. The state superintendent has interpreted the law to imply that these as well as more advanced students shall enter the public high schools.
