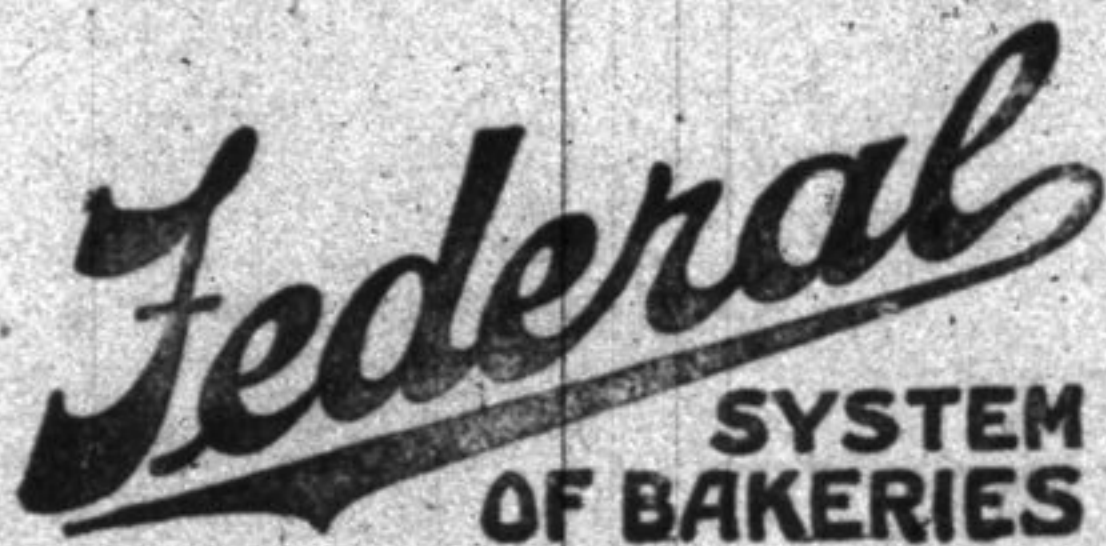

The raid was conducted by Assistant Chief Tyrell and Policemen Thomas Booth and John Klindsworth. They had been tipped off that a gambling game was in progress. There

was a general scramble when they entered the coffee house and the gamblers made an ineffectual attempt to escape. They were taken to the police station where an immediate trial was arranged. The men pleaded guilty and were fined. Although Galennian was booked as keeper of the game the police say he merely was filling in while the real keeper was ill.
