BANK PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

Following is the yearly report made by President Frank J. Baker of the Highland Park State bank at the meeting of the bank's stockholders last week:

Highland Park, Ill., Jan. 8, 1921
 To the Stockholders of the Highland Park State Bank, Highland Park, Ill.

Ladies and Gentlemen:
 More than the usual pleasure is afforded me in submitting this report to the annual stockholders' meeting, because — first, we have behind us another year of prosperous business; and, because — second, I am reporting to seventy-two stockholders as compared with only nineteen, one year ago.

The increase of the bank's capital from \$60,000 to \$100,000 through a stock dividend, is the most significant feature of the year's business. It strengthens the position of the bank, enables it to do the larger things, and permitted the distribution of some stock to a number of friendly and influential business and professional men of Highland Park.

Increased deposits, unprecedented discount rates on commercial paper, and freedom from losses of any consequence, made possible net earnings, after taking care of a shrinkage in the sale of some securities, and providing for an increase in the bank's contingent fund, of \$2,500. The bank building, which is in good repair, and fully rented, shows a contribution to the said net profits of \$2,626.29. Stockholders were paid \$6,450.00 in dividends and the remainder went into the surplus account. On the date of this report, the book value of each share is in excess of \$125.00.

Statement of the bank's resources and liabilities at the close of business December 31, 1920, hereto attached, shows deposits of \$1,287,694.25, an increase for the year of \$149,227.19.

I am voicing the sentiment of the bank's directors and officers, when I bid a hearty welcome to our new stockholders, and invite their cheerful co-operation, not only in the upbuilding of the business, but also in expanding the bank's influence and usefulness in the community.
