**BODY OF OLD MAN
 FOUND IN RAVINE**

NO IDENTIFICATION MARKS

Ravinia Man Discovers Body
 While Working on Tele-
 phone Wires; Inquest
 Wednesday

The inquest for the strange old man, who was found dead in a Glencoe ravine, has been continued to next Wednesday. In the meantime an effort is being made by Cook county authorities to identify the body.

The man was found Friday, Jan. 7, in a ravine at the corner of Sheldon and Franklin avenues, Glencoe, by Thomas Welch, a lineman for the telephone company. Mr. Welch lives opposite the station at Ravinia.

A cord fastened around the dead man's neck, and made fast to a sapling at the edge of the ravine kept the body from slipping to the bottom. The man was apparently between 60 and 65 years old. He had very thin features, blue eyes, and a large nose. Thin white hair covered his head, except a bald spot at the back. He was fairly well dressed, and wore a blue overcoat, blue serge suit, grey sweater, sole rubbers, and a black cap with green lining.

There was no mark of identification anywhere in the man's clothing. A watch was found in his pockets, but no money.

The inquest has been postponed, but it is generally agreed that suicide was the cause of death. The body is lying in the Chicago morgue awaiting identification. It will be left there until the inquest next Wednesday.

**AUTO LICENSE BLANKS
 READY NOW FOR 1921**

Motorists May Get Them From Any
 Notary Public in Person,
 or by Mail

Any automobile or truck owners who have not yet made application for their 1921 state licenses may procure blanks at the city hall. A supply of these blanks has been secured by the various notaries for the convenience of the motorists. No charge is made for this service. Those who desire blanks may call for them in person, or they may procure them by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

The schedule of annual fee is as follows:

25 h. p. and less, \$8; 25 to 35 h. p., \$12; 35 to 50 h. p., \$20; more than 50 h. p., \$25; electric cars, \$12. If a car has been previously registered in this state, the annual fee must be paid, no matter in what month the re-registration is effected. Full instructions for the filling out of the application blanks are printed on the reverse side.
