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NORTH SHORE LINE ASKS RATE BOOST

Road Wants Flat Rate of Three Cents a Mile for Illinois and Wisconsin

Representatives of the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroad

this week made a plea for an increase in fares before the interstate commerce commission. The road asked a flat rate of 3 cents a mile for both Illinois and Wisconsin. The rate now is 2 cents in Illinois and 2.7 cents in Wisconsin.

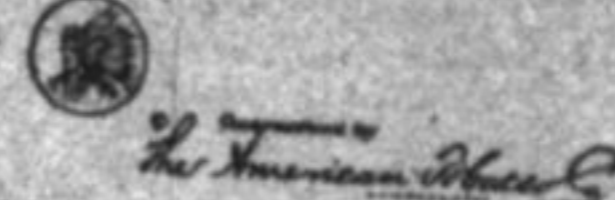
Examiner Paul O. Carter, who sat for the commission, was told by Chas. E. Thompson, of the road that the

closing down of factories along the right of way had decreased ticket sales 10 per cent. He said the fare boost was necessary to make the road pay.

Assistant Attorney General Morton Culver represented the State of Illinois to oppose an increase in the rate.
