win became unconscious and everything that was possible was done to save his life, but the efforts were of no avail and he passed away Sunday morning.

His wife and three sons, Edward Bennett, Frank James, and Raymond Felix survive him. The oldest son Edward who was on his honeymoon trip to California was located at San Diego, Sunday and returned home immediately. Frank Sherwin, who is president of the Elkhart, Ind., branch of the Chicago Hardware Foundry Co., reached home shortly after his father's death.

Mr. Sherwin was born March 6, 1859 and came to Chicago from Cleveland in 1882. On January 2, 1888 he was married to Elizabeth Englebrecht. In 1893 he went into business and became president of the Chicago Hardware Foundry Co., at No. Chicago.

He was a member of the Illinois Athletic Club and was an active worker in the Knights of Columbus, Grey Iron Foundryman's Association, Chicago Foundryman's Machinery Club, Illinois Manufacturers Club, Royal League and Chicago Chamber of Commerce.

Funeral services were held this morning at eight forty five o'clock from the Immaculate Conception Church, Dr. O'Neill officiating.
