

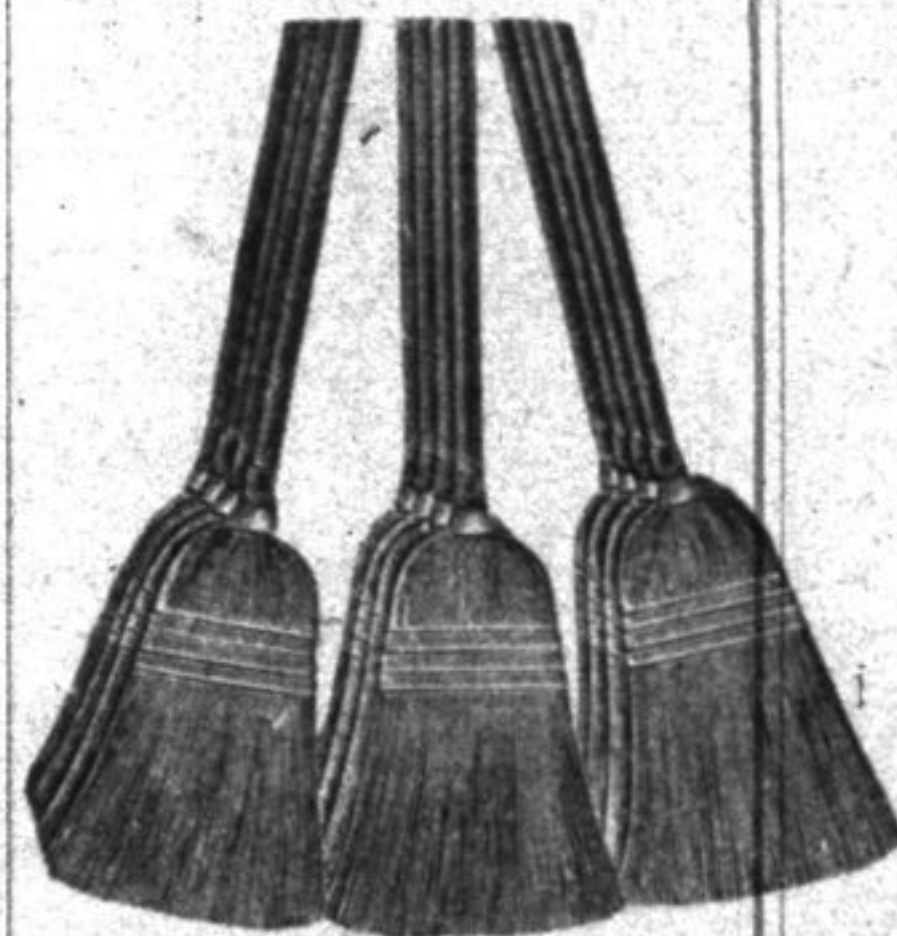

The congregation was favored last Sunday evening by a sermon by the Rev. A. E. Hangen, editor of "The Evangelical," the church organ of Harrisburg. He was at Chicago to attend the meeting of the church commissions which lately met there to make final arrangements for the organic union between the United Evangelical church and the Evangelical association. For over 12 years these commissions have been at work arranging the basis of union and have at last decided by a great majority to recommend it to the respective conferences of the two denominations for ratification. It will be presented to the fall conferences in the fall of this year and at the spring conferences of 1922. If the conferences vote to ratify the two general conferences will be called into session at Detroit, Mich., in Oct. 1922. If the general conferences ratify the new church will come into being and the two conferences will unite and legislate for the new church which will be called the Evangelical Church.

The pupils drink directly from the bottles, using straws for that purpose. The dairy company charges five cents for a bottle. Milk will be served only to pupils sending to Miss Johnson a written request for such service.

Promotions took place on Monday morning and new pupils came in to the kindergarten and the beginning primary. Two new teachers came to join the Elm Place staff. Miss Georgina Sharp came from Cape Girardeau, Mo., to teach a group of 14 pupils; Miss Floella Shimmick of Reddick, Ill., came to assist in the office and to carry some fifth grade classes. Mrs. Osker was transferred to the 3B room to occupy the position formerly held by Miss Clara Smith.
