### CITY COLLECTION OF GARBAGE IS PLANNED

(Continued from Page One)  
garbage is made. The service is irregular, and is paid for from the garbage tax. There is also a special garbage service, which makes collections three times a week at a cost of \$5.00 a year for each customer. The total amount of the garbage tax is \$31,000. This, with what is received from special service customers, makes the department self-supporting. There are approximately 4,900 customers.

The city of Wilmette pays a farmer \$2400 per year for collecting the wet garbage. The dry garbage is collected by the city at rates ranging between \$6.00 and \$12.00 per year. The service is said to be very unsatisfactory.

Winnetka, with a population of 7,000, has all its garbage collected by the city tri-weekly. The rates are between \$7.75 and \$3.00 per month. This system has been in operation for four years, and has proven satisfactory.

In Glencoe, a city of 3,400, the city makes collections three times each week, and the service seems to be entirely satisfactory. The service has been in operation since May 1, 1920.

Regulations governing the collection of garbage are printed on the reverse side of the contract cards, which are being circulated.

It is expected that the number of subscribers will greatly exceed the 600 mark.
