Highland Park Council No. 1066 of the Royal Arcanum held a very enthusiastic meeting last Monday night when nine applications for membership were read and four candidates were initiated.

W. J. O'Neill, grand regent of Illinois occupied the regent's station, and John Kiley, grand secretary acted as orator, Henry D. Overdier of Lincoln Park council, was guide, and needless to say the ceremony was impressively conducted, Mr. Overdier presenting to each of the candidates a solid gold button as a memento that he had led them through.

Herman H. Goldberg, Ulrich Light-hall, Bert E. Kirby and W. H. Leuer were the lucky recipients.

The grand officers had another purpose in favoring the local council with their presence, as they felt that a tangible expression of their appreciation of the good work Highland Park has done in the recent contest, when Illinois achieved the victory over the great states of Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and New Jersey, and last week in Chicago received from the supreme regent the prize of one thousand dollars.

Duffy had appropriated part of their thunder in presenting to Past Regent William Grant at the meeting on Jan. 10, a veteran's badge, however, there were others and he called to his station Past Regents James H. Duffy, Frank B. Green, Fred A. Tucker and Herman Deinet, and presented to each of them a veteran's badge.

LOCAL GIRL DIRECTS ORCHESTRA IN CONCERT

The orchestra of the North Carolina College for Women, under the direction of Miss Helen Mayer of Highland Park, and assisted by Miss Elinor Beach, soprano, gave a delightful concert at the college February 22nd, before a large crowd of students and townspeople. The concert gave abundant evidence of patient and thorough training and the numbers, several of which were difficult, were played in a manner worthy of professionals. Miss Beech, teacher of voice in the college, sang a group of songs by Horszmann—"The Shepherdess" and "The Bird of the Wilderness"—Miss Alice Valden Williams accompanying her on the piano, and one song with the orchestra, Scott's "The Winds of the South." In these songs she revealed beauty of tone and great flexibility of voice.

The orchestral program opened with Mozart's "Don Juan Overture," which was played with much power and richness of tone. The work of the violins in this number was unusually good. "Evening Chimes," by Rollinson, and Valse Lento, from Lullini's "Ballet Russe," gave evidence of ability in music of a different type, with attractive orchestral effects. Two dances by German, from his "Henry VIII" were played with much skill and finish. "The Shepherd's Dance" was very melodious, and the "Torch Dance" was played with much brilliancy and breadth of phrasing. The last orchestral number was a medley of American airs entitled "American Patrol," by Meacham. The organ parts were played by Prof. George Scott-Hunter.

The orchestra, composed of 21 members, has been under the personal direction of Miss Helen Mayer, teacher of violin in the college and violin soloist at the First Presbyterian church in this city. She has directed the college orchestra for the past three years and has made it a worth while musical organization. Miss Mayer studied the violin in Prague and Berlin for several years, and her thorough musical training and experience have been largely responsible for the orchestra's success.

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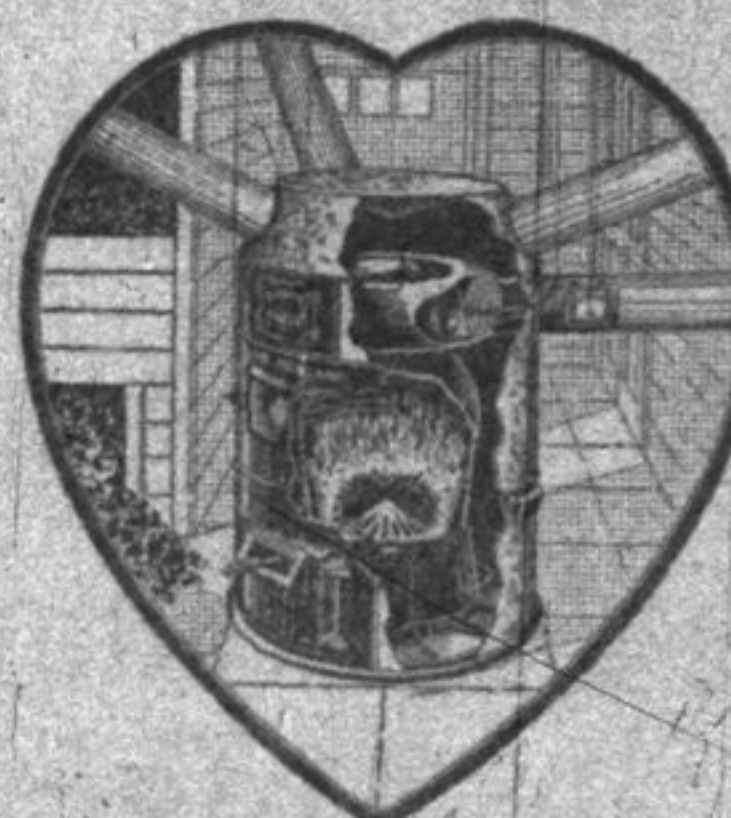
