Lenten Services—

Probably during no preceding year have Protestant Evangelical churches given so much thought to the significance of the Lenten period. The all but universal feeling of uncertainty and unrest; the baptism of fire and blood to which humanity has been subjected; the complete removal of old institutions and foundations; the unmercifully thorough demolition of a civilization; Christian in appearance and name, but founded upon suspicion, avarice and greed induced by a materialistic philosophy; all these cause men to think more and more seriously of the church and the message she has for the world. And what men expect that message to be can best be told in the words of Vice-President Calvin Coolidge in an interview previous to the presidential campaign. The conversation was sought by Henry S. Huntington who desired to learn what Mr. Coolidge had to say about the place of religion in the life of the nation. In reply to the question "How can the church do its work more adequately?" he said, "By returning to first principles. Jonathan Edwards preached sovereignty. In the first three centuries of the church they preached that. The church doesn't do that now, and it is not gaining so fast." "Except a grain of corn fall into the ground and die," and other quotations from Christ's words occurred frequently.

The Lenten period is unusually well suited to direct our thoughts to the Christ of God and to remind us of our responsibility to Him. For this reason special services will be held at Grace church during Passion and Holy Weeks. There will be a service every night except Saturday. Each service will be sponsored by some organization or group. The texts and themes for the two weeks will be placed in the hands of the people as well as the name of the group sponsoring the particular service. The official board has authorized an evangelistic singer. The officers and teachers of the Sunday school have been provided with a carefully prepared plan that will take care of the Sunday school's end of the program of evangelism. The minister will be his own evangelistic speaker and with the support of the various groups and officials we are looking forward to a wonderful day on Easter. This will be membership day. For those accepting Christ for the first time it will be the day of open confession. All new recruits for the Master's service will be placed into classes for religious instruction. The sacrament of baptism will also be administered on this memorable day.

The service on Palm Sunday morning will be sponsored by the entire Sunday school. It is the purpose to have all members of the Sunday school have the parents present at the morning service. A sort of family service where father and mother sit in church with the children.

On Palm Sunday evening, Miss Moseley, representing the missionary work as carried on by Dr. Grenfell in Labrador, will give an illustrated talk on that work. We will be very glad to welcome Miss Moseley to our church and fully expect that she will have a good hearing.
