HELP CHECK THE STEALING OF AUTOS

Petition Circulated Asks Legislature
To Increase Penalty for Car
Thieves

Indispensable to the business life of the nation, more necessary, possibly, than any other mechanical contrivance, the motor vehicle occupies a place by itself.

Much of our wonderful prosperity, as a nation, is due to the automobile. But, because of its fleetness, its convenience, its carrying power, it has, likewise, been seized upon by the criminal element and to this element it has proved a useful tool. There is no doubt that the growth in crime, and particularly robbery and attendant murder within the last decade or two, has been entirely due to the use of the automobile for lawless purposes. Seldom is the account of a crime printed in the newspapers but that the automobile figures as a factor in some way or other.

The stealing of automobiles is thus a basic crime leading directly or indirectly to many others. It is as easy for the conscienceless criminal to "step on the gas" as for the owner. It matters not to the thief whether he burglarizes a garage door lock, steps into a car waiting to speed a doctor on a life or death call or seizes a car at the point of a "rat" from the owner on pleasure or business bent. Before the alarm can be spread the thief and car are lost in the maze of streets or roads and quickly reach safety miles away, possibly killing pedestrians in the wild escape.

The Chicago Journal of Commerce has circulated throughout the state a petition of the Illinois Legislature to increase the penalty for auto theft, which was embodied in House Bill No. 42 introduced by Representative Ralph E. Church on February 1st. Our readers are asked to join in the movement to check this crime by requesting their Representatives and Senators to provide for an increase of penalty for the stealing of automobiles—House Bill No. 42 follows: Fifty-second General Assembly, 1921 **HOUSE BILL NO. FORTY-TWO** Introduced by Mr. Ralph E. Church, February 1, 1921. Read by title, order printed and referred to Committee on Judiciary.

A BILL For an Act to amend Section 39 of the "Motor Vehicle Law," approved June 30, 1919, in force January 1, 1920. Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. Section 39 of the "Motor Vehicle Law," approved June 30, 1919, in force January 1, 1920, is amended to read as follows:

Section 39. Whoever feloniously takes or steals any motor vehicle or receives or buys any motor vehicle, with intent, by such receiving or buying, to defraud the owner, or conceals any motor vehicle knowing the same to have been stolen, shall be imprisoned in the state penitentiary for not less than three years nor more than twenty years.


