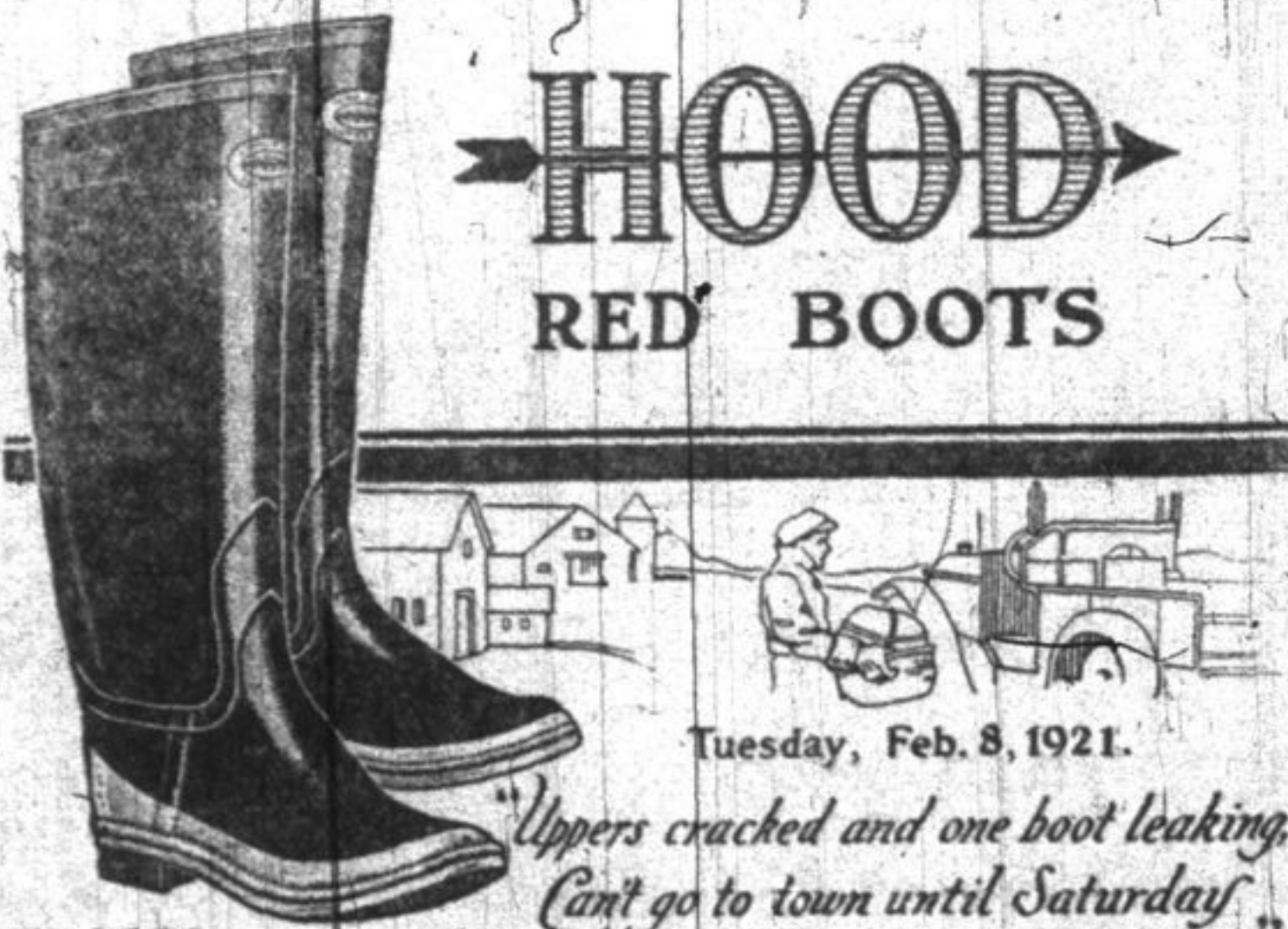

FILES SUIT TO OUST WAUCONDA RAILROAD

W. C. Foster Enters Claim Against Company; Wants Railway Land

W. C. Foster on Friday filed a declaration in circuit court which actually provides for an ouster of the railroad company from the right of way along the Wauconda and Palatine R. R. The action is a sensational climax in the affair of the Wauconda railroad and may bring precipitous developments which will either save or bury the road completely.

Last week the Public Utilities commission of Illinois ordered the railroad company to file a report to show how the company had complied with the orders of the commission some time ago whereby it gave permission to the company to sell stock and bonds providing they had cleared up the road of all encumbrances. A point in the argument before the commission was that the promoters had failed to live up to the order of the commission in that they had gone out and sold bonds and stock to Lake county people without having cleared up the tax title which Mr. Foster owned through purchase at a tax sale. The order of the Utilities commission last week therefore, makes it incumbent upon the officers and promoters of the railroad to go before the board and show in what way the previous order was complied with. It is contended by representatives of Mr. Foster that the railroad company cannot prove that it did comply with the Utilities commission's order in that they failed to clear the tax title, the tax deed which had been issued against the property in behalf of Mr. Foster.

The tax deed now totals about \$9000 and was purchased by Mr. Foster for about \$8000.

Tax Deed Questioned
It is recalled that about a year ago an effort was made to set aside the tax deed issued to Mr. Foster but Judge Persons in County court held the tax deed all right. The railroad company came back in answer to the stock holders that it would appeal the case but never did so. County Clerk Hendee and Lee McDonough were cited into court in Chicago to show why they should not be held in contempt of court for giving a tax deed to the railroad property while in the receivers hands but it was held that they acted within their rights and later Judge Persons held the tax deed legal. Thus the claim of Mr. Foster is that the promoters of the road had no right to sell stock or bonds under the order of the Public Utilities commission, without having first cleared up the \$9,000 represented in the tax deed.

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NO CHANCE TO MAKE ICE THIS WINTER

Continued Warm Weather Ruins Last Hopes of Lake County Ice Harvesters

Proprietors of the big ice houses in Lake county have practically abandoned all hope of filling their houses this winter as they do not anticipate any zero weather which would be needed to make the harvesting of ice a satisfactory proposition. It is said that never before in the history of Lake county has there been a time when there has been less natural ice in the ice houses at this time of year. With the exception of the privately owned ice houses at Antioch, notably those which supply ice for the big hotels only, it is said no ice has been harvested. These small ice houses have been filled with nine inch ice. Ordinarily the owners would not have considered such thin ice but they became panicky this year when it appeared the winter was to be a mild one and their fears apparently were well founded. Had they not harvested this thin ice they would have none in their houses.

Several years ago a similar situation was presented and some ice house owners became panicky and filled their houses with six inch ice. Then along in the latter part of February there was a long spell of zero weather and ice froze to a thickness of fourteen to sixteen inches. The dealers then had to empty their houses of the thinner ice and make a new harvest. This year many of them figured that if they waited long enough they would get better ice, but February has passed without any severe weather and there is no indication that thicker ice can be expected this year. Thus the situation is anything but enviable.

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
