

WOULD IMPROVE DIRT ROADS IN ILLINOIS

Bill Introduced in Legislature Provides for State Assistance in the Road Work

Those who are eager to have dirt roads in Lake county improved immediately without waiting for the slower process of paving, are interested in the latest plan suggested at Springfield as seen by the following dispatch:

Springfield, Ill. — Improvement of earth roads in the state could be done without advertising for bids or public letting if a bill introduced in the senate by Senator Epler C. Mills of Virginia is placed upon the statute book.

Such improvement of earth roads could only be done, however, without advertising for bids and public letting if it has been voted to improve or repair the roads by draining, grading, dragging or oiling.

The bill specifies that the county superintendent of highways may in his discretion direct the highway commissioner of any district or town to have the work done without first advertising the bids and awarding the work at public letting.

The bill further provides for the payment of construction or repair of any bridge, part of which is in two counties. Relative to such work, after making an effort to secure the co-operation of an adjoining county without success, the county building the bridge may force the other county to stand a proportionate share of the expenditure.

\$9,888.74 IN FINES PAID TO THE COUNTY

When the convictions for violation of the prohibitory law and the assessment of fines began to pile up it was reported that a large percentage of the fines probably would never be collected, but doubt was dispelled Saturday when State's Attorney A. V. Smith turned over to County Treasurer Roy W. Bracher a check for \$9,888.74 and received therefore a receipt for that amount, which includes fines and court costs.

The above named sum is slightly more than three-fourths of the amount of fines to date, the total fines assessed being approximately \$12,000.

Of the fines not paid there are a number who have taken appeals and therefore the fines cannot be collected until the cases are disposed of, in event that the higher courts uphold the action of the local court. Among those who have appealed are Joseph and Marie Paule, whose fines total \$1,150, Tiodorra and Tony Favelli, \$600, John Madruh, \$800 and John Niemi, \$800. The total amount of the fines still in doubt is \$3,350.

The fines collected go to defray the expenses of the state's attorney's office and the remainder goes into the school fund of the county.
