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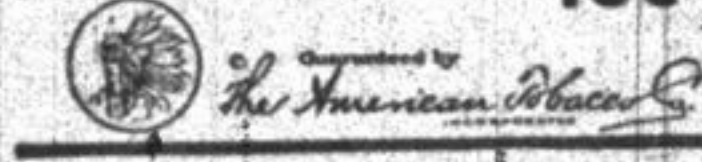
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DEERFIELD NEWS ITEMS

Pre-Easter Services—
On page 3 of last week's issue of The Press we gave quite an extended account of the services during Passion and Holy Weeks. We speak of these services at this time more briefly. The texts and themes and the names of the groups sponsoring the various services are now ready for distribution. The general plan of these services is to have the S. S. and various organizations of the church definitely related to the work. The task of each group is to give publicity to each service; take care of the people as they gather at the church; provide an order of service; select the songs and in the absence of the evangelist singer, designate some one to take charge of the music and congregational singing. The groups in the order of appearing: Monday, the 14, the official board; Tuesday, the Epworth League; Wednesday, the Ladies' Aid Society; Thursday, the W. F. M. S.; Friday, the young ladies' class; Sunday morning, the entire S. S. The children are asking their parents to sit in the church service with them. This will be a family service.

Sunday evening Miss Moseley, associated with Dr. Grenfell in his work in Labrador, will give an illustrated talk on the mission in that land. Monday, the 21st, the young men's class will sponsor the service; Tuesday, the 22, the two boys' classes

taught by Messrs. Jennings and Stoker; Wednesday, the 23, Mr. R. E. Winters' class; Thursday, the 24, Miss Ruby Dick's class; Friday, the 25, Mrs. J. L. Laeger's class; and Easter Sunday "Join the Church Day" the morning service will be sponsored by the entire S. S. and the parents will again attend the service with their children. The service Sunday evening will be sponsored by the entire church and congregation.

This will close the special series but will only mark the beginning of our work. The service Monday evening gives promise of the larger things ahead. No more favorable field for the practical application of Christian principles is to be found anywhere than here. But we must make sure that they are Christian. And we can be sure only as we enter into the most intimate and immediate fellowship with our Lord and Christ at this time. The enlarged program we have in mind can be carried out only as we are imbued by His spirit. This can come to pass only as we enter into fellowship with his sufferings.

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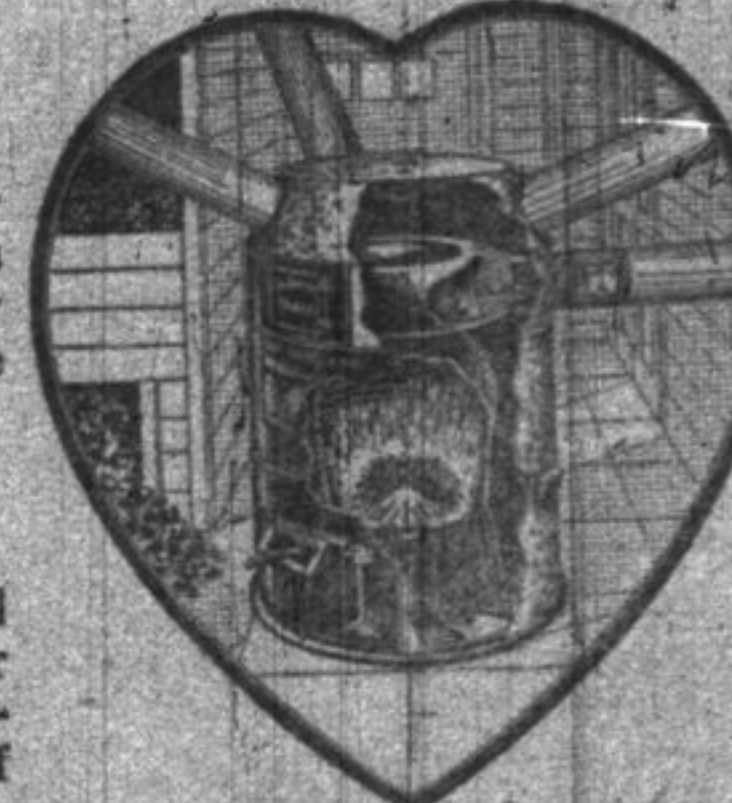
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
