LUXURIES COST MUCH MORE THAN SCHOOLS

Cigarets Alone Take as Much Money as Schools of Nation

Recently the Universal Press Service sent out a report based upon figures furnished by the United States Treasury Department. As you read this report, quoted below, remember that it is estimated that the public schools of the United States for the same year cost between \$700,000,000 and \$800,000,000, or considerably less than the amount spent on luxuries. "American women paid \$750,000,000 for rouge, lipsticks, powder and perfume during 1919, according to luxury tax returns at the treasury today. At the same time both men and women spent the enormous sum of \$22,700,000,000 for all taxable luxuries, the figures show.

"While the women were paying their beauty bill, the men were burning up \$1,310,000,000 in cigars and cigarettes. Of this amount \$800,000,000 for soft drinks to \$350,000,000. With fur selling at the highest prices in history, only \$300,000,000 worth were bought. For phonographs and pianos \$250,000,000 was paid, and for automobiles \$2,000,000,000. Chewing gum cost \$50,000,000.

"Here are a few of the other items in the nation's luxury bill: Joy riding, pleasure resorts and races, \$5,000,000,000; luxurious foods, \$5,000,000,000; luxurious services, \$3,000,000,000; toilet soaps, \$400,000,000; chewing tobacco and snuff, \$800,000,000; ice cream, \$250,000,000; and cake and confections, \$350,000,000.

From this it seems that we pay about as much for beautifying our faces as we do for educating our minds. We spend more than twice as much for tobacco as we do for education. The money spent for cigarettes alone would run the public school system as it has been run. And we chew and spit out enough of the weed every year to pay for the public school system. Many other interesting comparisons may be made.

The next time you hear anybody talking about the great cost of the public schools or opposing increased revenues for schools, quote a few of these figures. Doesn't it seem reasonable that this country should pay at least one-tenth as much for its public schools as it does for taxable luxuries? But one-tenth of our luxury bill is easily twice as much as the cost of our public schools.

NATIONAL GUARD ORGANIZES ATHLETIC LEAGUE

Plans Formulated at Dinner Conference in Chicago; To Hold Regime Contests

The Chicago National Guard Athletic League is now a reality. The organization which will guide and foster clean athletics in all the regiments of the city was born at a dinner-conference in the Canton Tea Garden, Wabash avenue and Van Buren street, which was attended by two hundred representative citizens in both military and civil life. Lawrence Whiting, chairman of the athletic committee of the Chicago National Guard commission, in announcing the plan for the establishment of a permanent system of athletics in all branches of sport, declared that \$175,000 had been pledged by citizens and business concerns to encourage inter-regimental and intra-regimental sports and in social and other ways make service in the Guard more attractive to the young men of the city.

Nothing but clean athletics will be tolerated, and in no branch of sport will any financial gain to individuals or set of individuals be permitted. Any money made through the athletic contests will be used for the purchase of more athletic equipment.

Athletic officers have been appointed by the five regiments of the city—the 1st, 2nd, 6th and 7th Infantry and the 1st Field Artillery. Coaches will be provided and experts like A. A. Stagg and Nels Norgren will give these officers the benefit of their advice. It has also been arranged that the National Guard athlete is eligible to enter the regular A. A. U. games. Boxing rings and wrestling mats have been installed in the armories, and the athletic officers have started to line up men for the baseball teams. These games will be played in the public parks and in some of the semi-public grounds. The final champion contests both in football and baseball, will be played in college grounds or other enclosed places. Two loving cups have been donated for track meet competitions, one by Frank O. Wetmore, president of the National Guard commission and the other by Robert H. Hunter, chairman of the executive committee. These are in addition to the gold, silver and bronze medals to be awarded winners in the individual events.

S. J. Duncan Clark, one of the speakers at the conference at which the league was organized, cited three chief benefits that would accrue from competitive athletics:

- (1) Initiative and resourcefulness; capacity and self control; the curbing of habits and desires.
- (2) The spirit of fair play, decency and fairness to opponents.
- (3) Team play; of democracy,

which, he declared, America needed especially at this time. The United States, he said, had not yet learned the lesson of the team play of democracy.

Mr. Clark also asserted that it was his belief that out of the National Athletic League would come some of the future Olympic stars.

PERENNIAL CROPS WILL ADD VALUE TO THE HOME GARDEN

Plantings of perennial fruit and vegetables add to the interest and value of every home garden. In localities where they may be grown, some fruit trees and bush fruits should be planted wherever space permits. In addition to the small fruits there are a few permanent vegetables which should not be overlooked.

One of these is asparagus, which will thrive almost anywhere, provided it is planted in good soil. A plot of ground 15 to 20 feet square in one corner of the garden will supply all the asparagus needed by an average family.

A few hills of rhubarb in sections where it will grow can be planted along the garden fence and furnish the family supply. The same is true of horseradish and of a number of the herbs, including thyme, tarragon, and sage.

Grapes of the type and variety suited to the locality should always be included in the home garden. These can be grown on an arbor over the walk where they require no extra space. Four to six vines of the standard varieties, and one or two of the southern type in their proper locality, will be sufficient.

In planning the garden, plant the perennial things where they will not interfere with the preparation of the ground and the cultivation of the regular vegetable garden. Place them around the outbuildings, along the fences and in the corners where they will not be in the way. Bulletins telling how to cultivate the various small fruits can be obtained from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

VETERANS TO HAVE OUTING AT FORT

CARE FOR 500 EACH WEEK

Over 5,000 To Have Vacations at Government's Expense According to Report This Week

More than 5,000 of the 8,000 enlisted former service men who are taking vocational training in the 6th federal district — Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan, are to have a vacation at the expense of the government this summer at Fort Sheridan, according to an announcement made Monday by Chas. F. Sylvester, director of the federal board for vocational education in this section. From June 15 to Sept. 15 there will be 1,000 men at the north shore army post at all times, every man having two weeks there, going from the 200 or more institutions of learning and industrial plants in "batches" of 500 weekly.

The wooden barracks erected in 1917 south of the main post buildings for the use of the reserve officers' training camp, some of which have been cleared away are to be used by the vocational men. There will be no uniforms, no discipline, no drill, no setting up exercises—in short nothing military to the camp. It will be a recreational outing purely and simply, according to Director Sylvester.

An Army Paradise
"Every man can lie in the shade all day and in his cot all night if he wishes," said Mr. Sylvester. "What we propose to do is to give every man under our care a two weeks vacation on Uncle Sam. Fort Sheridan is a beautiful summer resort. It has a fine beach, of which we will have the use; the view from the bluffs overlooking Lake Michigan cannot be better. The whole coast will be thrown open to the vacation men by Maj.-Gen. Leonard Wood, 6th corps area commander and commander at Fort Sheridan. He will assign one military officer to look after the comfort of the men who are to be his guests.

"The administration of the camp will be
