

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### M. E. CHURCH

The special pre-Easter services announced to begin the 14th, continued through last week and will continue until Easter. The various organizations sponsoring the services did well; each bringing a different crowd to the church. The attendance was good and the interest continues to grow.

Sunday Services

The services last Sunday were especially noteworthy. The S. S. experienced the largest attendance up to date, 113. The offering was very good. The morning service saw the largest attendance up to date. The teachers were asked during the previous week to have the pupils invite their parents to the morning service. The results were encouraging. While the parents did not all attend and while the officers and teachers did not all remain for the service, several parents arrived and a surprisingly large number of children remained for the church service. The interest and attention of these young people and children was most commendable. It was a real inspiration to all present and they are ready to repeat the experience.

The Epworth League had 18 present for the mission study class at 4 p. m. These young people remained for the fellowship hour from five to six when a fine luncheon was served by Mrs. H. W. Stoker and Mrs. J. C. Laegeler. Twenty-two were present for the fellowship hour and all except two remained through the Epworth League and church services that followed.

At 7:30 the chorus choir under the direction of Mr. H. V. Nichols gave several special selections. We are justly proud of this chorus choir of 15 young people. We feel that the best is yet to be.

At 8 o'clock Miss Moseley was introduced and presented in a most interesting manner the conditions and needs of the Grenfell mission in Labrador. She received a most responsive hearing and at the conclusion of her remarks an offering of \$1265.00 was made to that work.

The special services continue this week. Monday evening when the invitation was given to people to confess Christ as the Lord of their lives, we were all made glad to see eight persons come forward and announce their intention to dedicate their lives to Him and His service. Of these five were young men, one a young woman and the other two the mother of these young men and her 18 year old daughter. This service was sponsored by the young men's class. It was most fitting that these young men should declare themselves for Christianity. We have only one regret, that the officers and teachers were not present in force.

Tuesday evening the intermediate boys sponsor the service. These will be followed by the intermediate girls. And on Easter Sunday morning the entire S. S. will again sponsor the service. We are glad to say that the interest in these services is not at all confined to the S. S. men and women in this supreme question and we are trusting for God's blessing upon our consecrated efforts to bring to pass a complete transformation of community sentiment and community life so far as practical Christianity is concerned.

Easter

At 2 p. m. a special service will be held for the christening of a number of infant children. The parents and friends of the children will be as nearly on time as possible. ### TRINITY CHURCH

Trinity church was filled to the doors last Sunday morning.
