**CAMPAIGN OF LEAGUE
OF WOMEN VOTERS**
MARCH 21st TO APRIL 3rd

To Increase Membership in Organization to Standardize the Teaching of Citizenship

Illinois women, inspired by the success of the School of Citizenship held in Chicago from January 24 to February 5, are uniting in the Membership Campaign of the Illinois League of Women Voters, which commenced Monday (March 21) and continues for two weeks. Dollar memberships from 30,000 women will provide funds to make possible similar schools in every part of the state.

Fraternal organizations, church and parent-teacher societies, clubs of women from the farmers institutes and granges as well as domestic science clubs have been appealed to by Mrs. Henry W. Cheney, state president, Ill. League of Women Voters, to get behind this movement for standardizing the teaching of citizenship. Hundreds of women from the federated clubs are already active in the unbiased but all partisan civic work directed by the league.

On April 4th, a four-day School of Citizenship will open in Jacksonville. A teacher will be supplied by the Illinois League and more than a hundred women are enrolled for the course.

At the invitation of R. E. Hieronymus, Community Advisor of the University of Illinois, ten women speakers will represent the League of Women Voters on programs given in every county in the state during July. They will outline civic programs for use in various communities.

As the national convention of the League of Women Voters is to be held in Cleveland, April 11 to 16, the Illinois League hopes to report a banner membership as a result of the two weeks' campaign. **MANY APPLY FOR LAST
CITIZENSHIP PAPERS**

Forty-Seven "Alien Enemies" Now Want to Be Citizens of United States

After four years of waiting aliens who had applied for naturalization but whose applications were held in abeyance because their native countries were at war with the United States, at last are able to become naturalized. Forty-seven of such petitions are being acted upon in the Lake county circuit court.

There is enough naturalization work to keep the court busy for two entire days, and trial of cases has been postponed until Thursday in order that the 90 applications of prospective citizens can be acted upon. Ten of these applications are from soldiers.

While this perhaps is not a record number, it is one of the largest classes the court has ever handled here.

**AUTHER GIVEN THREE

**"HOME RULE" WRONG
SAYS SAMUEL INSULL**

STATE WOULD BE INJURED

President of Commonwealth Edison Co., Declares Such Regulation is An Economic Impossibility

Peoria, Ill.—Samuel Insull, president of the Commonwealth Edison Co., which serves Chicago with electricity, criticized efforts to cripple public utilities under the guise of so-called "home rule" in an address before the annual dinner of the Peoria Association of Commerce, here.

After tracing the gradual development of the utility industry from local plants to enterprises serving great areas, he said the industry had now reached the third stage of development—the status of an interstate industry.

"Illinois is already spanned by a series of interconnected electric transmission lines that extend in all directions beyond the boundaries of the state," said Mr. Insull. "By the construction of a few comparatively short links, these Illinois lines would become part of the transmission system linking Minneapolis and St. Paul on the north, with St. Louis and Louisville on the south and with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh on the east and thence to the Atlantic seaboard.

"It is only by the development of these state-wide and interstate transmission systems that we shall attain the utmost in utilization of electricity in two extreme directions—electricification of the railroads on the one hand and electricification of the farms on the other.

"Already 10,000 farms in Illinois are drawing from across country transmission lines, the same kind of electric lines, the same kind of electric light and power current that works for city dwellers. With these transmission systems unhampered by parochial regulation, electricification of the railroads east of the Missouri river is only just around the corner.

"By a step backward to local regulation of public utilities, and to consequent obstruction of this development, farm electricification will be checked and railroad electricification indefinitely postponed.

"The natural economic development is encountering its most senseless opposition in the very place where it has been most useful to commerce and industry and organized society. That place is right here in Illinois, the heart of the Mississippi Valley 'electric belt,' where public utility services is higher in efficiency and lower in cost than anywhere else in the world."
