John O'Keefe was born in Perth, Scotland, August 24th, 1860. In 1874 his parents came to the United States and located on a farm in Osceola County, Iowa.

He began his railroad career in 1878 and was made Freight Conductor in 1881. He came to Chicago in 1887 where he became active in the Brotherhood Home movement. October, 1903, he was elected SECRETARY-TREASURER and MANAGER of the Home corporation and took up his residence in Highland Park. In six and one-half years he raised sufficient money to build the beautiful Home as it now stands.

HIS WAR RECORD

October 16th, 1917, he was appointed as a member of the County Auxiliary Committee of the State Council of Defense. When the Committee organized October 23rd, he was elected Chairman.

January 30, 1918, he was commissioned by Wm. E. Ball, National Director, Enrollment Agent for the United States Public Service Reserve. In this work he enrolled the names of sixty-three volunteers from this county.

February 2, 1918, he was appointed member of the Food Production and Conservation Committee. In this work he gave special attention to the war garden movement.

January 2, 1919, he was appointed special agent in the United States Employment Reserve at a salary of One Dollar a year, a position which he still holds so far as he knows.

He is a member of the Highland Park Business Men's Association, a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, a member of the brotherhood of all railroad employes, a member of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and a member of the Highland Park Lodge of Elks, and is serving his second term as Exalted Ruler.

LAKE COUNTY WILL SEND 35 DELEGATES

Meeting to Choose Representatives Probably Will Be Held Next Week

Lake County will send thirty-five delegates to the judicial convention to be held in Rockford, Saturday, April 9. This is more delegates than both Boone and McHenry counties together.

Supervisor William Stratton, chairman of the county central committee was in Waukegan Saturday making arrangement for the holding of a meeting there of the committee at which the delegates to the Rockford convention will be named. Mr. Stratton plans to send out the call for the meeting within a few days. It is expected it will be held about April 4.

Everything points to the fact that it will be smooth sailing for the three judges who are on the bench at the present time as the only way opposition could develop would be by means of petitions which would put them on the ballot as independents.

NORTHWESTERN MAY REDUCE WAGE SCALE

GENERAL CUT IS EXPECTED

Railroad Officials Confer With Employes Over Matter of Wages; Another Conference Monday

Steps were taken last week by the Chicago & North Western railroad to cut wages of its employes.

The action was taken at a conference between road officials, maintenance of way employes and laborers held in the offices of the company.

The conference was for the purpose of reaching an agreement on what constitutes reasonable and just wages.

The Chicago & North Western is basing its proposed reduction in wages in the decreased cost of living as compared with April 1920, when the United States railway labor board granted the increase.

It also justifies its claim because of the decrease in pay for similar kinds of labor in other branches of industry in the same territory.

It is proposed to discontinue the payment of time and one-half for the ninth and tenth hours, and instead work maintenance of way forces eight or ten hours, as the men may desire, paying pro rata for the ninth and tenth hour.

Should the representatives of the employes and the company's officers fail to reach an agreement it is proposed to refer the matter to the United States railroad labor board in accordance with the provisions of the transportation act.

Conferences with designated representatives of other classes of service will be held in Chicago at an early date, the object being a general reduction in wages.

According to announcement sent out by the Chicago & North Western, officers of the company will meet representatives of other branches of its employes in certain designated classes in room 1211, general office building, 226 West Jackson boulevard, on Monday, April 4, at 10 o'clock.
