WELCOME MEN WHO WERE MADE CITIZENS

Waukegan Extends Honors to 74 New Citizens; Patriotic Program With Talks

Waukegan extended honors Wednesday night of last week to its 74 newest citizens. The reception was held in the circuit court room at the court house, the guests of honor being the aliens who had successfully passed the naturalization examinations held Tuesday and Wednesday. The reception was in line with a plan decided upon some time ago to show every possible consideration to the newly made citizens in order that they may understand that they have attained something which is very valuable to them.

The 74 aliens are men who came from a number of European countries. In response to the roll call Thursday night the former citizens of other countries came forward and stood in groups. The oath of allegiance to the United States then was administered. After this had been done a committee of women, members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the American Legion stepped forward pinned small American flags on the coats.

Judge C. C. Edwards then turned the meeting over to Assistant States Attorney Albert Hall who officiated as chairman. A twelve piece band from the naval station played several selections, including "America." All those in the room sang in unison.

Judge Edwards, States Attorney Smith and Atty. Diver then were called upon to give short talks. These talks were an appeal for patriotism. In response to a request three of the new citizens also gave talks. The meeting closed with the playing of the national air.

The court room was comfortably filled with spectators, the affair being one of the most successful of the kind yet held there.

MAY ERECT SHAFT AS MEMORIAL TO POPE

Bill Introduced in Legislature to Build Monument in Lincoln Park, Chicago

A shaft to the memory of Judge Nathan Pope, who saved eight thousand square miles of territory to the state of Illinois by having congress fix the northern boundary of this state 42-30, will be erected in Lincoln Park, Chicago, if a bill introduced in the lower branch of the general assembly by Representative Edward J. Smejkal of Chicago, becomes a law.

The preamble of the bill recites how Judge Pope, as a territorial delegate in congress, on his own initiative secured an amendment to the enabling act so that Illinois included the northern tier of counties.

The action of Judge Pope saved to Illinois the fourteen northernmost counties and more than half of the population of the states including what is now the second largest city in the country. His action also was largely instrumental in preventing Illinois from becoming a slave state, the preamble says.

In discussing his measure Representative Smejkal declares that if the original line had stood Illinois would have had no lake front and Chicago would have been in Wisconsin. The line, as it was fixed through Pope's efforts, still stands as the northern boundary of Illinois though there is some dispute as to the correctness of the line 42-30 as so designated by the surveyors.

The bill carries an appropriation of \$35,000.
