On March 29, I saw a robin in Sunset Park. Its most striking colors were gray, brown and red. When flying it flashed colors under the tail. The robin flew up and down wavy-like.

The robin seemed to sing cheer-up! cheer-up! When I saw this robin he was sitting on the ground. Once in a while he sang a note. You will usually see him singing in the tree tops or on the ground. He does not sing when flying.

As this robin came nearer I could see his breast was red, wings were brown, tail was also brown. The top of his head was blackish brown, the eye streak yellow and the back was brown. His bill was medium in size. The tail was rounded.

The robin eats insects from the trees, earthworms from the earth, fruit from the trees, especially cherries and vegetables from the gardens. Mister and Mrs. Robin spend the winter in southern United States.

The nest is placed on flat or level limb, or forks in trees. The nest is made of mud, grass, and strings. It is lined with feathers. The eggs are bluish green and it has four eggs.
