CHARLES JOHNSON CASE

DEADLOCKED FOR 17 HOURS

Mistaken Defendant Identity in Railway Robbery Affair West of Highland Park

Two members of the jury in the case of Charles Johnson, charged with having made an effort to steal two barrels of whisky from a freight train on the Chicago and North Western west of Highland Park last fall, held the jury all night long, last Thursday night, a total of seventeen hours. At 9:30 Friday morning the jury still was deadlocked. When Judge Edwards ascertained there was no possibility of an agreement being reached he dismissed the jury. It is reported that from the first the jury stood 11 to 1 for acquital. The case went to the jury at 4:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Toward morning another jurer swung over to guilty and the two of them held until

Railroad detectives, testifying for the state, told of having been hiding beside the tracks at Upton when they saw two men push two barrels of whisky out of the door of a freight car. The two men then jumped out, when the officers called to them the men are alleged to have started to shoot. The officers returned the fire, using shotguns charged with buck-

When the smoke cleared away the detective found Johnson lying wounded on the ground. He was taken to a hospital where 24 buckshot were removed from his side and leg.

Johnson took the witness stand and asserted it was a case of mistaken identity. He said he was on his way to Milwaukee in search of employment and was stealing a ride on the railroad. He said he jumped off when he saw the brakeman coming. At that moment he said he saw two railroad detectives with guns aimed at him. He says that without a word they opened fire on him.

Evidently the jury was impressed with his story for the majority felt that he was not guilty.

Moir Returns When William Moir, indicted jointly with Charles Johnson with having participated in a booze robbery from a Northwestern freight train at Upton last fall, did not appear in circuit court last Thursday when his ease was called for trial Judge Edwards ordered that his bond be forfeited. At the time he was arrested Moir had put up a \$1,000 cash bond but it is said he never had appeared to be arraigned after he was indicted.

Shortly after the case of Johnson had started Moir appeared in court unexpectedly and announced that he was there to give himself up. He said he had been in Missouri and did not know it was necessary for him to put up an additional bond. He said he came here as soon as he found the case was to be placed on trial. On the strength of his statement the court withdrew the order to forfeit the bond. Moir was released on a \$2,000 bond.


