Philip Zellar, an old resident of Zion, dropped dead in the First State Bank in that city last week Wednesday. Mr. Zellar fell suddenly while transacting business at the bank. Heart trouble is believed to have been the cause of his sudden death. He was over seventy years old, and had been night watchman during the Dowle administration.

Justice of the peace D. M. Mickey, of Wilmette, refused to try the case of Theodore Becker of Zion by mail Saturday, issuing a capias for his arrest. Mr. Becker, who is chief of police at Zion, was arrested several days ago by Motorcycle Policeman George Schaefer for speeding. Mr. Becker offered to mail a check for the fine.

The government boat, Manitowoc, is in the Waukegan harbor making soundings to determine how much dredging will have to be done this year. The Manitowoc arrived Friday. Storms from the east have a tendency to wash sand into the Waukegan harbor, filling up the channel, and this has to be removed to permit the safe arrival and departure of vessels.

A large crowd attended the "good roads" dance and dinner held at Grayslake Monday evening. The entire proceeds of the dance will go to buy crushed stone, so that there will be a good supply on hand at all times to do road repairing. The idea was originated by the village board and the Legion post at Grayslake.
