#### SHOULD BE READ BY ALL

## Advice Given by City Attorney Samuel S.

Highland Park Press: As you know that contrary to the Attorney General's opinion predicated upon the holding of the Supreme Court in the case of People vs. Vail et al decided last December affirming the County Court of Lake County, which held the action of the board of review illegal when it attempted to raise the valuations of the assessor made for Highland Park in 1919, 30%

on the same illegal valuation. In 1920 there are additional parts of the tax levies illegal in that they exceed or violate constitutional or statutory requirements and limitations causing an approximate total of 32% of the taxes extended on real estate
