## COLLEGE BOOSTERS START CAMPAIGN

Association is Active in Drive for New Students; High Schools are Visited

Realizing that the best way to attract new students to Lake Forest college is through the students who are enjoying its privileges, President Moore has organized among the students what has been termed the Lake Forest College Booster Association. At the head of this group is William Grant McColey, a senior. He has been largely responsible for some of the very practical and unusual methods of acquainting the immediate vicinity with the advantages and opportunities of Lake Forest College. He has organized the student body into groups of one kind or another, making each group responsible for a certain amount of specified work in connection with making the name of Lake Forest known far and wide. His first move was to send out a circular letter to all the high school students within a radius of fifty miles of Lake Forest. This letter was signed by his own name as president of the student organization. Following this letter he has sent requests to the principals asking for an opportunity to speak to the juniors and seniors of the school. Already he and one or two other members of the committee have spoken to three or four assemblies, at Waukegan, at Deerfield-Shields and at Libertyville. In addition to this sort of visitation there have been invitations extended to the high school principals to speak at the chapel exercises. As a further part of the plan to extend the Lake Forest interest into the neighboring secondary schools two of the basket ball games of the college varsity have been played on high school floors. In February the team won a hotly contested game with Bplot College, playing the game before a large crowd at the Waukegan high school. Later during the same month a game was played with Northwestern College on the Deerfield-Shields high school floor.

and the endorsement of the Kindergarten bill now before the State assembly. These resolutions were recently passed by the Federation of Women's Club of the 10th Congressional District in annual session representing 9,000 members and last week were adopted unanimously by the Elm Place P. T. A. Copies of these resolutions are to be sent to our representatives and to the members of the committees on appropriations.

Mrs. Francis D. Everett in a short talk gave some important reasons why the state distributable fund should be raised from \$6,000,000 to \$20,000,000 this year; (a) Illinois is 2nd in wealth in the U. S., but is 24th in educational rank and support of its schools; (b) schools are running into debt at the rate of \$15,000,000 a year; (c) 180,000 children are now being taught in basement and unsuitable rooms and three out of four teachers are under-trained and nearly all teachers are underpaid. New York has a distributable fund of \$32,500,000; Ohio this year with a wealth of \$8,908,000,000 has raised its distributable fund to \$19,000,000 and as the wealth of Illinois is \$15,484,000,000 can we not justly hope and work for a state distributable fund of \$20,000,000?

Short and interesting reports of the Tenth District Federation meeting held at Glencoe on March 17th were given by Mrs. Harry A. Luther and Mrs. Geo. W. Rosseter.

Miss Helen Daniels sang two groups of songs in a charming manner. Miss Muller was at the piano.

## THE TAX SITUATION

of the County Collector. It is stated by the attorneys that it will be impossible to get a decision of the court before the 15th of April, but that property owners may safely wait until the 30th of April before paying taxes and by so doing will incur no penalty other than costs amounting to 13 cents on each separate real estate description. Property owners should understand that the contemplated court proceeding is to be brought for the benefit of all owners of real estate in Highland Park and that if a favorable decision is reached, all taxpayers will be benefited by it.

The only objection to taxes as now extended on the Collector's books that will be urged and heard in the contemplated court proceeding is that arising out of the horizontal raise in Highland Park valuations attempted by the Board of Review in 1919. The Supreme Court has held that the Board of Review in so acting did not proceed in conformity with the law and that the raise was therefore illegal. Notwithstanding this decision, the County Clerk extended taxes for the year 1920 upon the valuations as attempted to be raised by the Board of Review, the result being that the taxes extended against all Highland Park real estate are, to a considerable extent, illegal.

It has been reported that there are other irregularities in the 1920 taxes which would not stand the test of careful examination, but the City authorities who have encouraged the City Attorney to file the bill for injunction, have not felt warranted in attacking any other feature of the 1920 taxes than that part which has been adjudged unlawful by the decision of the Supreme Court. Every effort will be made to push the proceeding to an early hearing and to advise property owners promptly of the court's decision. Meanwhile those who have not paid their taxes are advised of the contemplated action so that they may govern themselves accordingly.

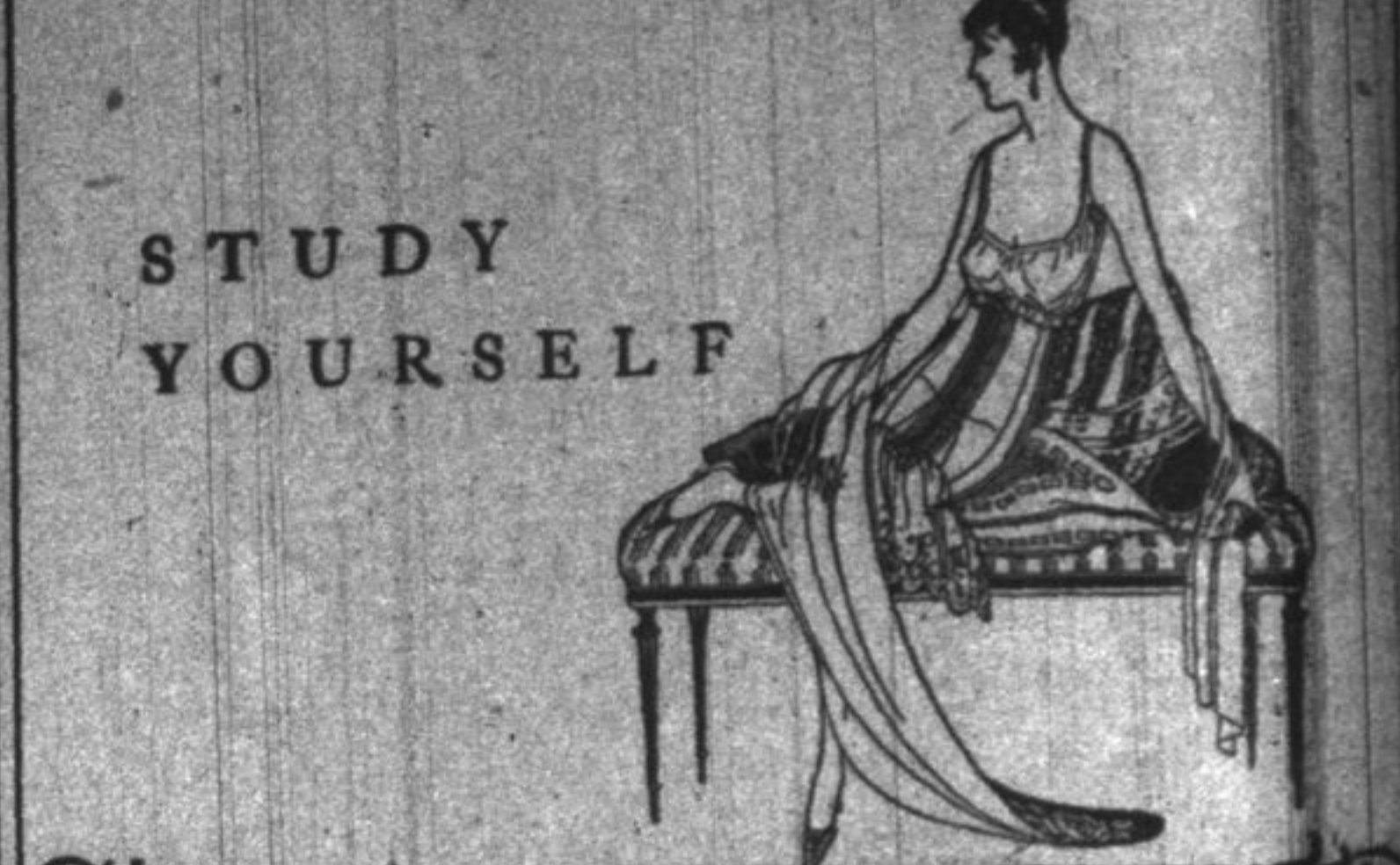
