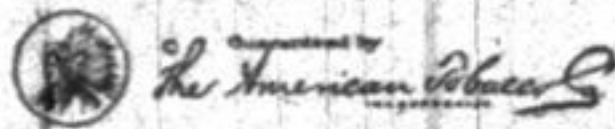

#### ZION LUTHERAN CHURCH

Trinity Lutheran church, located for the last 74 years on the Green Bay road near the County line, will dedicate a new church on Sunday, April 17th. The history of this church dates back to the year 1847. In those early days, before the Northwestern railroad or the Milwaukee Electric were even dreamed of, Lutheran pastors came from Chicago in ox-carts to conduct services. Trinity church had its members scattered from Evanston to Lake Forest and became the mother of all Lutheran churches on the North Shore. Zion Lutheran church of Highland Park branched off in the year 1891. Now the membership of Trinity is restricted to Glencoe and its vicinity, so the new church is located in Glencoe, at Greenwood and Hawthorne.

Three services will be conducted on Dedication Day. In the morning at ten there will be a German service at which the Rev. W. F. Suhr will officiate. In the afternoon at three and in the evening at eight English services will be held, the Rev. E. F. Schueler of Quincy, Ill., preaching in the afternoon and the Rev. Karl Schlierl in the evening.

There will be neither morning nor evening service in Zion Lutheran church on Sunday, in order to give our members an opportunity to attend the celebration.
