**JUDICIAL CONVENTION
HELD LAST SATURDAY**

DELEGATES AT ROCKFORD

Judges C. C. Edwards, R. K. Welsh and E. D. Shurtleff Given Unanimous Vote in This District

The three sitting judges, Judges C. C. Edwards of Lake county, R. K. Welsh of Winnebago county, and E. D. Shurtleff of McHenry county, were unanimously re-nominated by the Republican delegates from this, the 17th Judicial District, at a convention held in the court house at Rockford Saturday afternoon.

The convention was called to order by Arthur E. Johnson of Rockford, chairman of the Winnebago county delegation. Upon motion James M. Huff of Belvidere was nominated for chairman and William J. Smith of Waukegan, Lake county, was nominated for secretary. Following their election as temporary officers organization be permanent and the call for the convention was read.

Attorney Elam L. Clark of Lake county then presented the following resolution and moved its adoption, being seconded by Mr. Johnson of McHenry county.

Resolution
WHEREAS, the present Judges of the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit of the State of Illinois, are all eligible for election at the coming Judicial election, and

WHEREAS, Hon. Claire C. Edwards for the past seven years has filled the position of Circuit Judge in this Circuit in a manner to elicit the praise of the Bar, and obtain the confidence of litigants by his impartial demeanor and his judicial rulings, and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Robt. K. Welsh brought from the Bar to the Bench a profound knowledge of the law, and has presided with dignity and success as a Judge, and

WHEREAS, the Hon. Edward E. Shurtleff brought to the Bench the ripe experience obtained in Legislative halls, and has during the short time he has graced our Bench, shown Judicial qualities which place him on the high plane occupied by the other two Judges, and

WHEREAS, the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit is to be congratulated upon the character and ability of these three gentlemen who now serve it.

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved by the Delegates assembled at the Republican Judicial Convention at Rockford, Illinois, this ninth day of April, A. D. 1921 that said Claire C. Edwards, R. K. Welsh and Edward D. Shurtleff be, and they are hereby nominated as Republican candidates for Judges of the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit at the June election, A. D. 1921, and

Be it further resolved that the Chairman and Secretary of this Convention certify the names of Claire C. Edwards, R. K. Welsh and Edward D. Shurtleff as such candidates to the Secretary of State.

Delegates Lost in Storm
The delegates to the convention were entertained at luncheon at the Nelson hotel as guests of the three presiding judges who were present at the time.

Following adjournment of the convention the Lake County delegates headed by Judge Edwards, drove in autos to Lake Geneva where they had a very fine chicken dinner. However, the drive was not without exciting incidents for the autoists got into the very severe blizzard of Saturday night and those drivers, some of whom had been driving for many years, declare they never went through such a blizzard in their lives. The north shore here had a small blizzard but it wasn't comparable to the weather in the northwestern part of the district.

The roads were something fierce and the snow and wind came down so that the drivers were blinded. It certainly was a wild, exciting ride which the judicial delegates had by way of Lake Geneva and then later home. The storm was so bad that some of them remained in Lake Geneva all Saturday night and those who did take the drive home got lost en route and had an "awful time."
