## THE CONSTITUTION

### A DEAD LETTER

#### LEAGUE SEC. GIVES VIEWS

Points Out Measures in Senate Alleged to Deprive Citizens of Medical Rights

Legislation which officials of the Chicago branch of the American Medical Liberty League declare will absolutely deprive the citizen of his right to freedom of choice in matters medical, has been introduced in the State Legislature of Illinois. These measures, if passed, according to the officials, will render the citizens a mere adjunct to the machinery of the state and county boards of health, under the control presumably of physicians of the allopath school of medical practice.

Mrs. Lora C. Little, secretary of the American Medical Liberty League recently issued the following statement:

"Whom the gods would destroy—" the old pagan saying comes to mind in noting the official utterances and attitudes of State Medicine lately.

Dr. Herman Spalding of the Chicago department of health in a published interview the other day told the world there is no such thing as constitutional right where health is concerned. "We," he said, "have the authority to draw the line where your constitutional rights begin and where they stop."

Could even the great Lenine improve on that gesture?

The medical bills now before the Legislature would seem superfluous, in view of such a declaration of omnipotence. But it appears the medical autocracy still weakly clings to the forms of law. Hence the following, among others:

Senate Bill 187 was introduced by Dr. John A. Wheeler, and provides for medical county health commissioners — to be appointed at the discretion of county boards — who are to have all the powers of peace officers for carrying out the orders of the department of public health, and it is made their duty to enforce said orders.

Senate Bill 294, the same author, is the same thing, save that the Governor shall appoint the medical county health commissioners.

House Bill 344 by Mr. Sonneman of Carlinville is also a medical county health commissioner bill.

Senate Bill 363 makes a parent guilty of murder whose child dies as a result of refusal, failure or neglect to provide "necessary medical care," when such failure was "with malice aforethought." (Otherwise, it will be manslaughter). And if the child gets well as the result of the treatment which is not the "necessary medical care," the parent can only be fined \$500 or sent to jail 6 months, or both.

Dr. Spalding pointed out to his interviewer the other day that "the minority has no rights that interfere with the welfare of the majority, and we are the authority to decide what is good for the majority."

He told the reporter that he took chances with his life every day in getting news. "They send you up here and you don't know but that I might take a notion to shoot you."

In view of what the doctor had just said, it is plain that should he take a notion of that kind and act on it, making the plea that it was for the welfare of the majority, it would be strictly correct according to politico-medical Hoyle.

Notwithstanding all these pleasantries of health-boardism, it is the opinion of the American Medical Liberty League that it is the duty of all citizens to write their legislators and Governor to refuse assent to any and all such bills, and notify them that they will hold them to the duty of protecting rights that are quite as precious as health and even life, the memorable saying of Patrick Henry still being in point.

#### TO REPORT ON TRUANCY IN TWO TOWNSHIPS

Mrs. Carl Anderson of Deerfield to Locate 200 Children Under 16 Not Attending School

Mrs. Carl Anderson of Deerfield is working on a report for the truant officer of the Deerfield-Shields High School. In the past week she has visited all the schools in the two townships and is trying to locate approximately 200 children, whom Mr. R. L. Sandwick believes should be in high school. These are children under sixteen years of age.

Next September a continuation school will be started, as required by law. Any parent or guardian prohibiting a child up to sixteen years of age from attending this school will be liable to a fine of \$100.00 for each offense, and any employer employing children, who should be in attendance at this school will be liable to a fine of \$50.00, and will be compelled to discharge such a child from his employ.

The village of Deerfield is being especially criticized for its neglect in the all important matter of truancy, but there are cases of this both in Lake Forest and Highland Park, also.
