If you want an early crop of tomatoes, make use of plants grown in 3 or 4 inch pots such as have blossoms on. This will mean ripe fruit in July.

For summer flowers there are the asters, zinnias, scabiosas, snap dragons, salpiglossi, calendulas, marigolds, cosmos, summer larkspur and a lot of others. You can purchase the transplanted seedlings now and cut flowers from the middle of June on.

Rosy Moore petunias are among the very best of window or porchbox plants and are ready to be planted. Still time to put fertilizer (blood and bone) on your lawn, garden and flower beds. Sow grass seed.
