PLANE CRASHED AT FORT SHERIDAN

Mechanic Injured When Army Plane Made Too Hasty Descent Tuesday

Lieut. Alfred L. Jewett, pilot, and Mechanic Edwin Hinds were forced deliberately to crash their plane near Fort Sheridan Tuesday to avoid smashing into the wires along the railroad tracks. The machine landed in the field west of the north gate station.
