### LIBERTYVILLE FIRST IN SALE OF STAMPS

Treasury Department Issues Report for January and February in Lake County

War savings stamps or "baby bonds" as they were known during the war, continue to be a popular investment with many people in Lake County. The treasury department has just sent out a report showing the number of second class postoffices in Illinois during January and February. Libertyville leads the sales in Lake County with a total of \$1,758.81 for the two months despite the fact that the sales for February dropped to \$24.16.

Waukegan took second honors with a total of \$1,273.83 for the two months.

In Zion the sales for January amounted to but \$1.75 but \$368.58 worth were sold in February.

The following figures show the number of savings stamp sales for the first two months this year, no record being given of the third and fourth class offices:

### RADISHES FROM THE HOME GARDEN

Easiest to Grow of Garden Vegetables; Instructions Given For Proper Cultivation

Radishes are about the easiest garden vegetables that can be grown. They grow and mature in a month or less in almost any soil. For these reasons the radish is one of the most popular of the early spring vegetables, found in every home garden. The beginner should not be confused with the many varieties that all seed catalogues display. The best early spring kinds are the Scarlet Turnip White Tip and the White Icicle Radish. To extend the season the larger varieties such as Crimson Giant are valuable. With the coming of hot weather these early varieties cannot be used as they become dry, pithy and woody. They should, therefore, be planted as early in the spring as the ground permits, if the soil is a sandy loam, and in heavier soils seeding should be delayed until the ground is quite warm. Continue plantings at intervals of two weeks up to June 15th. The summer varieties must be sown about May 15th. Among these the white half-long kinds are the best for this locality, such as the White Strasburg. These are ready for use in July.

Radish seed should be planted thinly, two seeds per inch, in a trench one-half inch deep, covered and packed down firmly. The rows should be 12 inches apart. It is best to have several short rows of not more than 10 feet coming on at intervals of two weeks, this will insure a constant and abundant supply of fresh, firm radishes throughout the season. The summer varieties being larger than the early varieties should stand 2 to 3 inches apart in the row. Thinning is not necessary, this being done as the radishes are pulled for eating.

Good cultivation and weeding are necessary to get a good crop. As it takes radishes only 3 to 4 weeks to mature they can be planted between the rows of slower maturing vegetables such as: beets, carrots, and parsnips. The radishes are harvested and are out of the way long before the other vegetables mature. Radishes should be harvested and eaten as soon as they mature, otherwise if they are allowed to remain in the ground too long they become tough, pithy and unfit for use.

### TWO DESERTERS WANTED FOR SEVERAL CRIMES

Left Naval Station After Robbing Tailor Shop; Charged With Other Jobs

Ralph Eschenback and William W. Marks, two former sailors at the Great Lakes naval training station, are wanted by the station authorities on a charge of having "jumped ship" which is tantamount to desertion. But the government may not have a chance to punish them until the civil authorities are through. Here are some of the charges which the young men must answer: 1.—Wanted in Waukegan on a charge of having broken into the North Shore tailor shop on Washington street on the night of April 25 and stealing eight or nine suits of sailors' uniforms. 2.—Wanted at Moline, Ill., on a charge of having broken into a clothing store and escaped with merchandise valued at \$1000. 3.—Suspected of holding up a restaurant and shooting a waiter at Iowa City, Ia. The men have been arrested in Moline.

### INJUNCTIONS GRANTED AGAINST BOOTLEGGERS

Judge Edwards Orders Several Lake County Drink Emporiums Closed

Judge C. C. Edwards, in the circuit court last Saturday granted United States injunctions, filed several days ago by State's Attorney A. V. Smith, which compel William Schmidt, George Koeth, Sr., former justice, and his son and daughter-in-law, George, Jr., and Mrs. Barbara Koeth, all of Fox Lake, Philip Levandoski, Fourteenth street, North Chicago, and Jacob Grahek, Tenth street, Waukegan, to close their drink emporiums. The injunction compels them to refrain from selling or disposing of intoxicating liquors in their various places. This is the first instance in Lake County in which State's Attorney Smith has closed the place of prohibitory law violators. Violation of the injunction carries a penalty of from \$500 to \$1,000 fine or from 30 days to one year in jail or both.
