**PLAN NEW WING FOR COUNTY COURT HOUSE**

**MAY USE BEDFORD STONE**  
 Building Committee Visits New Winnebago Structure; Other Items of County News

The building committee of the Lake County board of supervisors went to Rockford last Thursday to look over the big addition to the Winnebago county court house which was recently constructed. There is some talk among board members of building the new wing of Bedford stone, so that in case the court house is entirely rebuilt the contemplated addition would harmonize with a new building. The committee has practically decided that the wing should be built on the west side of the present structure.

A chapter of the Ku Klux Klan may be organized in Waukegan. A representative of the order was investigating in that city last week. If the lodge is organized it will be conducted similarly to those in other cities, with the white robes and caps, which characterized the order during the post Civil War period. Candidates must pass a stiff examination.

One of the largest and finest barns in Lake county has just been completed on the Howe farm near Antioch. It provides for cattle, dairy, cows, hogs, horses, chickens, implements, feed, etc. The cow barn is equipped with stalls in each of which is the name of the occupant. The barn is surrounded by a high fence made of cobble stones.

Mrs. Venta Kasperaitis, of North Chicago, charged with violating the prohibition law, failed to appear in Judge Person's court last week, and forfeited her \$2,000 bond. Her bondsmen finally succeeded in getting her into court, but she refused to be separated from the infant she held in her arms. The court could not incarcerate the child, so it had to let the mother go free. She refused to pay a fine of \$200. The court was in a quandary.

Four Waukegan young men were arrested Saturday charged with beating Julius Bradzke, the new village marshal of Gurnee. According to Charles Hall, of Wilson the men beat the marshal when he attempted to protect Hall's sister and another from the attentions which the four insisted on paying to the girls.

Women guests at Zion Home, the hotel of Zion, may not use the public telephone unless dressed according to Zion Standards it is said. Mrs. M. W. Austin, a representative of the Burton Holmes Travelogue company, and a guest at the hotel for two weeks, appeared before a justice last Friday and sought redress for alleged indignities she sustained at Zion Home. She had been ordered out of the hotel when she attempted to use the telephone. The clerk first ordered her to return to her room for more clothing, declaring that she was too scantily dressed.

Black Hand threats to "get" Nick Grana and his entire family unless he paid over \$2,000 were nearly carried out in Waukegan last Friday night when two large rifle bullets crashed through the front windows of his grocery store at 501 Market street. The bullets narrowly missed two members of Grana's family. Grana is an Italian, and has made his home in Waukegan for 17 years. The writers of the Black Hand letters threatened to "tear out" his heart and cut it into slices.

**AVERAGE PRICES PAID FOR PAPER**

The weighted average price of contract deliveries from domestic mills to publishers during March, 1921, f. o. b. mill in carload lots for standard news in rolls was \$5.862 per 100 lbs. This weighted average is based upon March deliveries of about 45,000 tons on contracts involving a total tonnage of approximately 680,000 tons of undelivered paper manufactured in the United States. The weighted average contract prices based on deliveries from Canadian mills of about 26,000 tons of standard roll news in carload lots, f. o. b. mill March, 1921, was \$6.480 per 100 lbs. This weighted average is based upon the March deliveries on contracts involving about 355,000 tons of undelivered Canadian paper. The weighted average market price for March of standard roll news in carload lots, f. o. b. mill based upon domestic purchases totaling about 2,600 tons, was \$5.623 per 100 lbs.
