Warned by the Black Hand that he had but three days to live unless he turned over \$2,000, Nick Grana, regarded as one of the most prominent members of the Italian colony in Waukegan, hurriedly closed his business affairs in Waukegan late Monday afternoon and disappeared from the city. He took his family with

"If it was just myself to be considered I would stay and fight it out with them, but I must think of my wife and kiddies; I cannot allow them to be sacrificed," Brana said shortly before leaving town.


