MAFIA THREATS MADE; GRANA FLEE FOR LIFE

Black Hand Letters Declared He Had Only Three Days in Which to Live

Warned by the Black Hand that he had but three days to live unless he turned over \$2,000, Nick Grana, regarded as one of the most prominent members of the Italian colony in Waukegan, hurriedly closed his business affairs in Waukegan late Monday afternoon and disappeared from the city. He took his family with him.

"If it was just myself to be considered I would stay and fight it out with them, but I must think of my wife and kiddies; I cannot allow them to be sacrificed," Grana said shortly before leaving town.

The Black Hand had threatened to kill not only Grana but to blow up his house and kill every member of his family. A series of threatening letters ordered him to take \$2,000 to Chicago and turn it over to members of the Black Hand society near the corner of Adams street and Racine avenue.

Last Friday night two rifle bullets were fired through the front window of Grana's store at 561 Market street. The bullets crashed into the wall but two or three inches from where Mrs. Grana and her married daughter, Mrs. Frances Rizzo, each holding a small baby, were sitting.

COUNTY PIONEER DIES IN ARKANSAS

James Blanchard Was First White Child Born in Lake County

James Blanchard, the first white child born in Lake County, died very suddenly Tuesday at Hot Springs, Ark., where he was taking the baths for rheumatism, according to a telegram received by relatives. Death was due to heart trouble. Mr. Blanchard was born at Dilleys Corners, nine miles west of Waukegan, eighty years ago. For the last thirty years Mr. Blanchard had been making yearly trips to Hot Springs. He had been there about six weeks this year.

For many years the deceased had conducted a farm north of Waukegan on North Sheridan road. For thirty years or more he had been highway commissioner. Four years ago he sold the farm and moved to Waukegan.

FOREST PROTECTION WEEK, MAY 22 TO 28

Gov. Small Sets Aside Week For Observance of Timber Protection in Illinois

Springfield, Ill., May 16—In a proclamation issued today setting aside May 22 to 28 as Forest Protection Week, Governor Small pointed out the value of Illinois forest land. He said: "The President of the United States has seen fit, in his wisdom, to call the attention of the people, by proclamation, to the great pecuniary loss and devastation caused each year in the United States through the destruction of our forests by fire. These destructive conflagrations, most of which could be prevented by carefulness and vigilance on the part of our citizens, add steadily to the present large area of unproductive lands and threaten a future timber shortage which would seriously affect our social and industrial welfare.

MISS MILDRED WELCH WINS MORE HONORS

Enthusiastic Worker in Recent Stadium Campaign at Uni- versity of Illinois

The following article was dispatched last week from Urbana. Miss Welch is the daughter of Mrs. T. J. Welch. They lived formerly in Highland Park.

"Miss Mildred Welch of Waukegan, one of the most prominent co-eds in the University of Illinois, was one of the most enthusiastic and untiring workers of Lake county in the recent Illinois campaign which netted nearly \$700,000 among the student body. Lake county's returns were \$45,000.
