

## "The Week's Work" Outdoors No. 5

A lot of good folks get the planting fever in Early Spring, but very few are ever bothered with hoeing fever and a lot of failure is due to this trouble—the heavier the soil the more it is necessary to cultivate around the plants. Tickle the soil with the hoe, let it breathe, keep the surface stirred up, there is nothing more beneficial towards plant development.

If you haven't enough money to buy plants you can sow out Candy Tuft, Marigolds, late Asters, dwarf Nasturtiums, Four-O'Clocks, Fucias and Calrudulas, they all will bloom by August. Have the soil fine, make a shallow depression about 1/2 inch deep, sow the seed and barely cover, the finer or smaller the seeds the less covering is required.

There is nothing to make your home more cheerful and attractive than a few flowers and if you haven't the room for beds or borders to plant them in, consider a few porch or window boxes, a concrete vase or a tub filled with bright colored Geraniums, Petunias and a few trailing vines—a home in the country without flowers of some kind, is no home, it looks cold and uninviting, no matter how well it is built or how expensive.

Get interested in gardening, get acquainted with plants and flowers—things that grow, try to make the home grounds what they ought to be and let the passers-by be the judges, it costs but little to plant a few flowers and always bear in mind that gardening is an occupation for which no man is too high or too low.

### TRINITY CHURCH

### OPEN ZION PAVING BIDS THIS WEEK

Road Officials Expect to Let Contract for Mile of Pavement

The state department of public works and buildings will open bids at Springfield this week for the construction of Section "M" state bond issue route No. 4 in Lake county, all of which means that at least one mile of Zion's "worst road in the state" will be built if the contractors submit figures inside the \$30,000 limit set by the state highway department. One contractor has signified his intention of meeting the price.

These specifications are for the south third and north third of the one and a half mile stretch on Sheridan Road through Zion. If the proposed contract is let it will leave only half a mile in the Zion business district that the city will have to finance. The north and south portions are in the worst condition by far and therefore the state improvement will be a great boon to automobilists.

### FIXING IT UP FOR NEW P. M.'s

There are 52,332 postmasters in the country, of whom 39,433 are in the fourth class, and these are protected by the civil service. There are also 700 postmasters in offices of the first class; 2,617 of the second class; and 9,582 of the third class. President Harding has issued an order which says that "obviously these officers are business agencies of the government in legal purposes and should become so in fact." The process of appointment for these places, upon expiration of the terms of these holding offices, shall be made from one of the three highest eligibles," says the President, who also states: "This order applies to all present incumbents of post-offices whose terms have expired and will apply to all incumbents as their present terms expire."

There should be plenty of comfort in that for "the man who won the election last fall."
