**D. C. PURDY & SONS INSTALL FORECASTER**

"Cyclo - Stormograph" Gives Warning of Weather Conditions to be Expected

Another delicate and expensive instrument known as a Tycoos "Cyclo-Stormograph," or simplified weather forecaster, has been installed for the information of the general public. Easily read and conveniently placed at the front entrance to Purdy's store, the passerby can readily consult the instrument and make his own deduction of weather changes likely to occur within the next twelve to twenty-four hours.

The new instrument automatically writes on a chart a continuous record of changes in the weight of the air, operating as a barometer or "weight measurer," and notes them correctly both as to day and time. Its ingenious construction is so sensitive that it will immediately show how much change there is and when the "weight" changes happen, "weather" changes of some kind will take place. When the weight decreases, the weather will become warmer, it may become windy and rain or snow, dependent upon the season, may fall. By its use one can tell at a glance the condition of the air as regards its weight, see if the change taking place is a slow or rapid one, or if the weight of air is being maintained. A forecast of the average weather probabilities can be readily formulated. The charts which are changed weekly thus also furnish an accurate and constructive record of weather conditions as indicated by barometric readings.

**PUCIN ROBBERS ARE GUILTY OF MURDER CONVICTED IN INDIANA**

Two Men Identified by North Chicago Man as Robbers Who Took \$13,000; Other County News

Abe Silver and his three pals, John Burns, Peter Fox and Joseph Byers, have been found guilty of murder in the first degree by a jury at Warsaw, Ind., and have been sentenced to life imprisonment in the Indiana state prison in Michigan City. Burns and Fox were identified by Andro Pucin of North Chicago, who was a witness at the trial, as two of the men who took part in the robbery of his store a few months ago. It will be remembered that robbers entered the Pucin store, held up the proprietor and several others, and escaped with \$13,000 in cash.

Sheriff Elmer Green and Deputy Sheriff Elvin J. Griffin last Friday morning found a stolen Ford roadster in the woods south of Lamb's Corners. The machine was out of gasoline, and the two front tires had been removed. All numbers had been chiseled off the machine, so that it has not yet been identified.

Armed bandits held up E. A. Smith, tailor, 19 Broadway, North Chicago, last week, and escaped with \$28 in cash. The leader of the gang, a large heavy set man, was assisted by two boys about 14 and 16 years old.

Federal prohibition agents, William Knourek and James Hagerly, who assisted State's Attorney A. V. Smith in the pouring of thousands of gallons of white mule and wine into the streets of Waukegan, and who worked in Lake County for several weeks helping the constables make a number of raids, have been dismissed. The reason is given that a lack of funds has necessitated retrenchment. Rumors of "shakedowns" are denied.

Two prisoners from the Chicago Bridewell farm at Hinsdale, who escaped last week, were captured later last week at Roundout, and were taken to the county jail. Both were still wearing prison uniforms.

Plans are about completed for the organization of a company of Illinois state militia in Lake County, with headquarters at Waukegan. Promoters of the company last week issued a last call for volunteers. This is the first time that a company of state militia has been organized in this county.


State approval of the improvement work near completion on Belvidere road near Grayslake is being held up because a farmer in the neighborhood refused to set back his fences, which have been built too near the highway. The farmer has threatened to get an injunction out against the workmen if they touch his fence.

It is estimated by city health experts that 55 quintillion flies have been destroyed by school children in Waukegan during the past two weeks. Ten cents is paid to the children for each 100 flies killed. The 10,000 reported killed could have produced 55 quintillion progeny.
