### NEW FOUNDRY COMPANY ERECTING AT WAUKEGAN

Elmer T. Skidmore and A. K. Barr form New Company. Plant Ready in 60 Days

One of the largest smoke stacks in the Terminal at Waukegan, was dropped yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock to make room for the new large foundry building now being erected and which will be occupied by an Illinois Corporation known as the Waukegan Foundry Co., who will have as its head Mr. A. K. Barr of Waukegan, who came from the east about 2 years ago, forming the Barr Pattern Company of which he was president and manager and who has had a life long experience in the foundry business, and Mr. E. T. Skidmore of Highland Park, Ill., who is well known in this locality and who has been employed by the Chicago Hardware Foundry Co. for the past fifteen years as credit manager.

In dropping this huge chimney it took with it so many of the Public Service wires that the operations of the American Can Co. were closed down for the balance of the day, while repairs were being made.

This stack represented a large amount of money for its erection and has been standing since the fire some years ago and was over 200 feet high having 4 foot walls, now one huge mass of fallen brick.

They will have a fully equipped foundry with all modern equipment ready in 60 days for the manufacturing of semi-steel and gray iron castings.

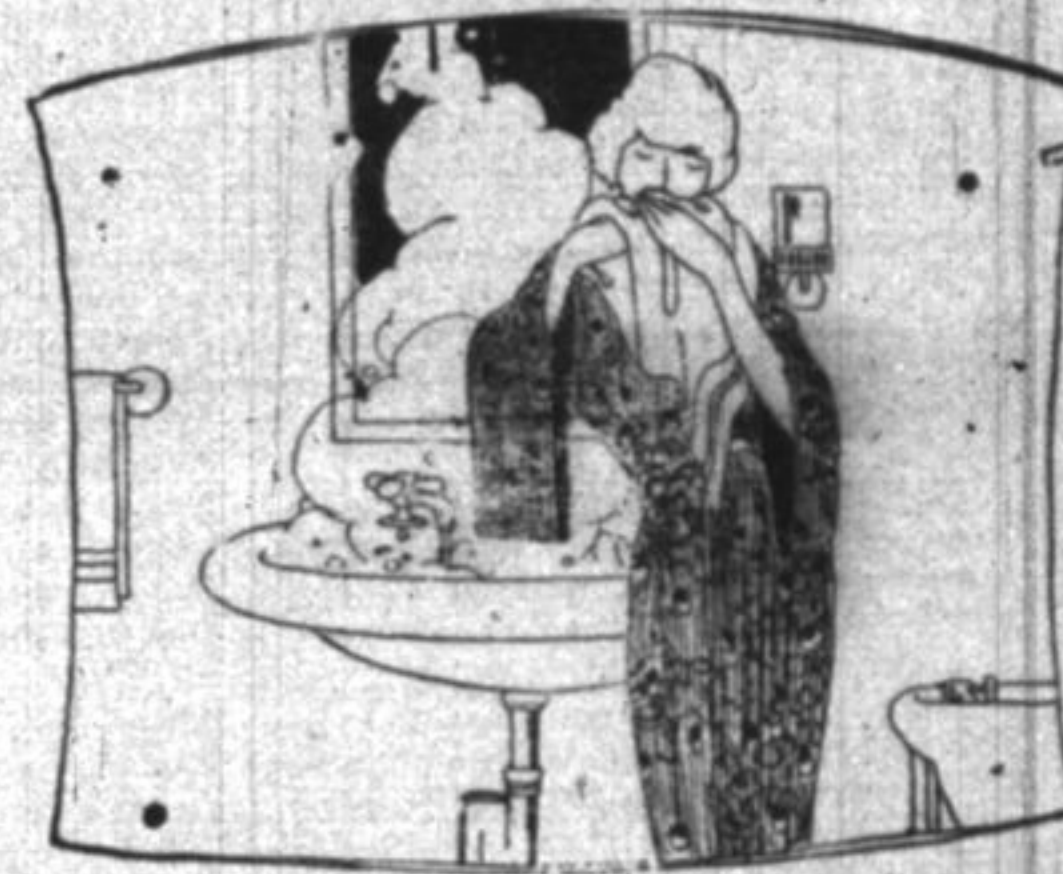

### NORTH SHORE LINE CUTS FREIGHT RATES

Announce Slight Reductions in Wisconsin; Now Practically Same As Steam Roads.

The Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Electric Railway company has issued a new tariff sheet governing freight rates for both the Illinois and Wisconsin territory served by the company. The new rates became effective under permit from the Wisconsin Railroad Commission on May 21st. It provides for a minimum charge of twenty-five cents for single shipments under carload lots and all the rates of the company are revised. Copies of the new traffic rates have

been supplied to all shippers in the territory. An examination of the traffic sheets shows that the company has reduced all of the rates for the Wisconsin territory while the rates between Kenosha and Chicago remain practically the same for all classifications.

It is said that the new rate effective on Saturday brings the North Shore rate practically to the same rate which is charged by the steam roads and the boat line. Before Saturday our rates in Wisconsin were higher than those charged by these other shipping agencies. The rate to Chicago is practically the same as it was with a few corrections made necessary on account of the demands of the Interstate Commerce Commission rates.
