

## A Good Resolution

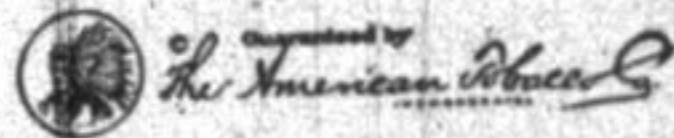
No More I'll rub and scrub my duds—

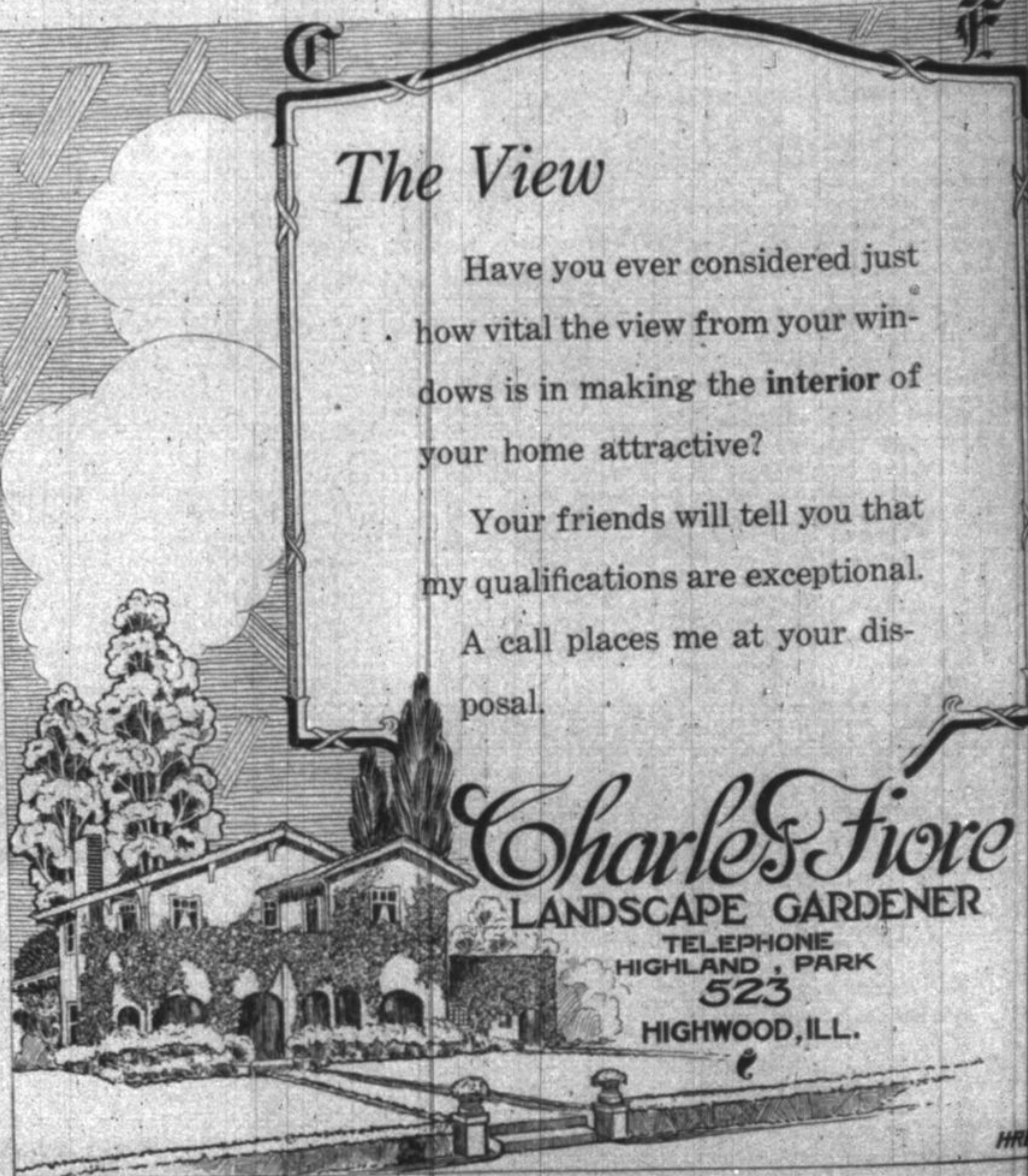
