It encourages all that is good in them and supplements every other educational agency. It is the invaluable ally of the schools and churches and stands for all that is best in our lives.

In the very nature of the case it is not easy to curtail the expenses of a public library without seriously impairing its efficiency and usefulness. If it were open only two or three days a week salaries of librarians would have to be continued, the building would have to be heated and new books would have to be bought.

The directors of the Public Library give their time and energy freely to it without any other compensation than that which comes from the consciousness of public service well rendered, they are persons we believe, who stand high in the public estimation and who deserve the support of the community.

We very much hope that their burden will be made as light as possible and that the people of our city will show their appreciation of the value of their library and will back up the library trustees by promptly contributing a sum sufficient to tide over the present emergency.
