HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

The inter-class girl's track meet took place last Friday afternoon. The Freshmen won by a margin of eleven points. The score was Freshmen, 28 points, Juniors 17 points, Sophomores 15 points and Seniors 10. Elizabeth Jaeger led her class to an easy victory by taking four first places. She broke the Deerfield girl's record in high jumping by making 4 ft. 7 in., one inch less than the national record for girl's high jump.

The 1921 athletic season for girls has been a rather unusual one in many respects. The Freshman class has proved itself quite worthy of mention, inasmuch as it has won the championship in three sports: basketball, track, and swimming. Great things are expected of a class which has made such a record in its Freshman year.

This is the first year that the girls who have shown merit in every branch of sport have received recognition. The awards given in assembly Wednesday morning are granted by the Deerfield-Shields girls Athletic Association, which was organized last year. Awards are granted on a point basis, under the Illinois League of High School Girls' Athletic Associations. This system is similar to the one used by the Girl Scouts—posture, team activities, sportsmanship and hygienic living being requisites—and every physical activity indulged in during the school year being counted.

Wednesday morning there was a joint assembly, given over to the presenting of awards granted by the boys' and girls' Athletic Associations. There was also a short resume of the athletic records and programs during the whole of the school year, given by Miss Byrn and Mr. Rothacher, the athletic instructors.
