AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION NO. 126 CHAPTER 27 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.
Sec. No. 126, Animals — That the running at large of horses, cattle, swine, sheep, goats and geese, within the City limits of the City of Highland Park, is hereby prohibited.

Sec. No. 127, Any owner or persons, or persons having charge, possession or control of any animals mentioned in Section No. 126 of this ordinance, who shall permit the same to run at large within the limits of the city of Highland Park, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and subject to a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) or more than twenty five dollars (\$25.00) for each animal running at large. Said fine to be collected in the same manner as other fines and penalties for the violation of ordinances.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:
Sec. 1. That Section No. 126 of Chapter No. 27, of the revised ordinances of the City of Highland Park, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:
That the running at large of horses, cattle, swine, sheep, goats, geese, ducks, and chickens and all other domestic animals within the city limits of the City of Highland Park is hereby prohibited.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance is hereby repealed.
Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.
