SEEK NEGRO FOR ATTEMPTED MURDER

MILWAUKEE MAN SHOT

Had Been Driven From Waukegan by Police; Other Late Items of Lake County News

Fred Wilson, negro, who conducted a pool room and soft drink parlor at 903 Market Street, Waukegan, is being sought by the police on a charge of attempted murder as the result of the shooting of Ralph Gordon, aged 31, also a negro, at Milwaukee Sunday night. Wilson had been chased out of Waukegan by the police because of his disorderly conduct.

The rough condition of Sheridan road through Zion was responsible last week end for an accident that resulted in serious injury to S. R. Faulkner, 42, master mechanic of the Omaha, Neb., fire department. An automobile in which he was riding left the concrete pavement at the north end of Zion suddenly and struck the rough stretch of road which extends through the city. Faulkner was hurled to the top of the car, and then was dashed back into the machine, his back striking a band of iron that supports the cushion. He was severely injured internally.

The fifty-third annual fellowship meeting of the Lake County Congregational churches was held at Milburn Tuesday. There are six Congregational churches in the county.

Races between homing pigeons and airplanes were started from the municipal pier Sunday as a preliminary feature of the Pageant of Progress. The planes were provided by Capt. D. W. Wurtzbaugh, commandant at Great Lakes. The pigeons flew between Chicago, Milwaukee, Batavia, and other cities.

Paddy Mahr, Waukegan, Friday morning sustained a fracture of his right leg when he was partly buried in a cave-in at the Reuben Thomas gravel pit on the Desplaines river near Libertyville. He narrowly escaped suffocating under several tons of gravel.

Following numerous complaints from residents in the neighborhood of Half Day, State's Attorney A. V. Smith last week sent his dry agents to the Vernon House at that place. The squad seized forty cases of beer and two bottles of whiskey. E. J. Olsen, the proprietor, was released under \$2,000 bonds.

State's Attorney Smith's dry "raiders" spent Saturday night and Sunday in the Fox Lake region, and paid visits to a number of places. Everything pointed to the fact that the various places were operating very quietly.

Derailment of a local car on the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad at North Chicago Junction about one o'clock Sunday afternoon tied up several main line limited trains, making it necessary for the latter to detour through Waukegan. A broken truck caused the accident. No one was injured.

CITY HAS INSTALLED NEW ELECTRIC PUMPS

Two New Centrifugal Machines Replace Old Timers Used Since 1894

Two old pumps which had been in service at the Highland Park pumping station since March, 1894, were removed last week, and new electrically driven centrifugal pumps have been installed. They were put into operation last Friday. The new machines have a capacity of 1,500,000 gallons each per 24 hours.

The coal storage capacity at the station has been increased by the construction of a new shed with concrete floor. It will hold 600 tons of coal.

Provision has been made just outside of the main building for a series of valves so arranged that the pumps may be used separately or collectively to pump into the present mains or mains that may be built in the future. In order to make the changes in the connections outside the buildings the mains and placing of the valves without shutting down the plant a temporary main was first put in through a by pass. A new cover has been put on the intake well, and a new bridge has been built across the ditch at the works. The present plant has a capacity of 6,000,000 gallons of water daily. The large steam pump will carry the brunt of the load, and the new electric pumps will be used for auxiliary purposes.

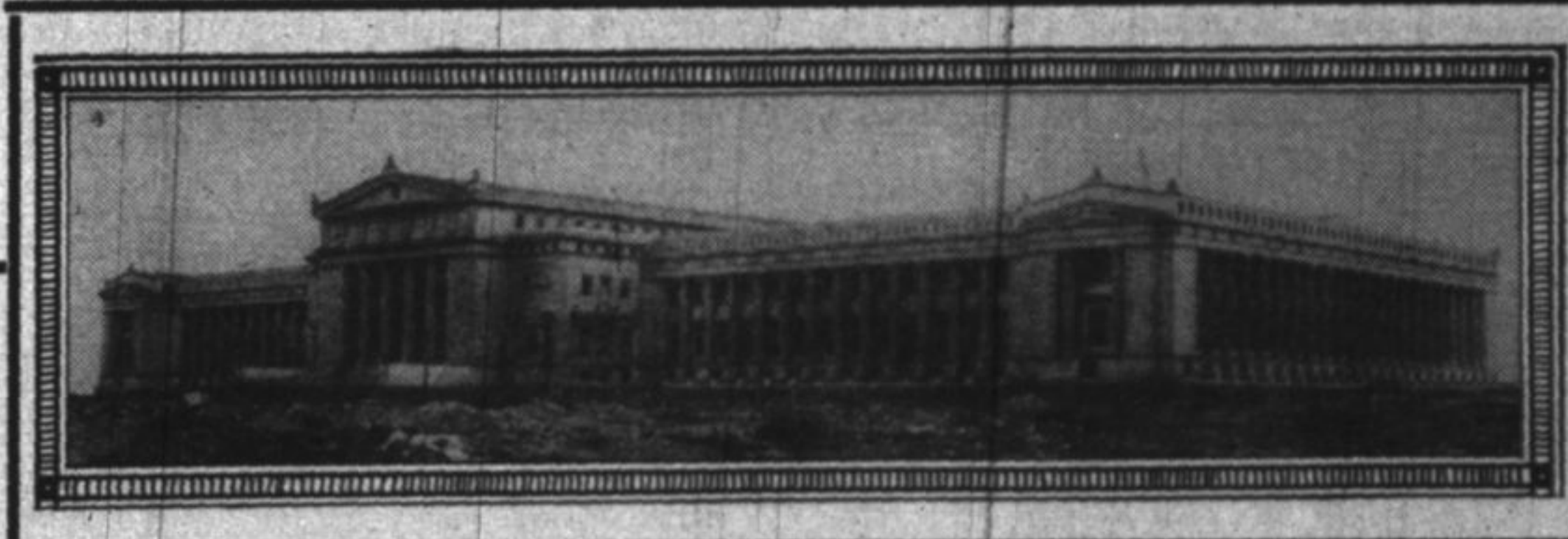
