been members of the church when it
was struggling for existence. In the
Bible school one speaker for each de-
cade told of the work of the school at
that period. The two principal speak-
ers were Miss Alice Davidson and Mr.
Grover, both of whom came here spe-
cially for the meeting.

Monday the Presbytery of Chicago
met in the church and there were
eighty-five ministers in attendance.
Luncheon was served to them at the
church.

Tuesday the women's organizations
gave a special program. Mrs. F. D.
Everett told of the work of the so-
cieties from 1873 to 1900. Mrs. H. C.
Tillman spoke for the missionary so-
cieties from 1900 to 1921. Miss Adele
Everett represented the Dorcas soci-
ety of the Westminster Guild and
Mrs. Carl Pfanstiel told of the activi-
ties of the Woman's League. Mrs.
Kepler Van Evers, one of the mission-
aries supported by this church in Chi-
na, was present and brought "Greet-
ings from Our Parish Abroad." Mrs.
Herbert R. Smith furnished the mus-
ical part of the program. After the
program tea was served.

Wednesday evening the church din-
ner was served in the parish house
and was attended by over two hundred
people. The speakers of the evening
were Miss Alice Davidson, one of the
early members of the church and as the
pastor's assistant because of the work-
done by her, Mr. R. W. Patton, who
has served longest as an elder in the
church, Mr. O. H. Morgan, who has
been a member of the church longer
than any one else now here, Mr. F.
D. Everett, and Dr. Bross Thomas,
who has been a professor in Lake
Forest University for over thirty
years, and has been one of the strong
supporters of this church.

Many interesting facts were related,
but probably none more interesting
than that of the first public demon-
stration of a telephone which was
made in the Highland Park Presbyter-
ian church by Mr. Elisha Gray, who
was without doubt the real inventor
of the telephone.

Mrs. Caroline H. Dennison and Mrs.
Ford Hall, two of the charter mem-
bers of the church, were present dur-
ing the celebration. Mrs. Emma Al-
len, the only other surviving charter
member of the church, was unable to
be present. Many who united with
the church during its early life also
attended the services.
