

John R. Thompson of Chicago offers One Thousand Dollars to anyone wh will give one good reason why the revolver manufacturing industry should allowed to exist in America and enjoy the facilities of the mails.

Here is a vital and practical question, placed before the public in a novel and emphatic manner.

If the private manufacture of revolvers and other deadly weapons

With death looking them in the face they submitted quietly. Not to have done so probably would have meant a murder. Having done so, it meant a loss of hundreds of dollars. No better illustration of the full meaning of our present indiscriminate distribution of revolvers could be found. When a man and his guests in the privacy of a home must submit robbery or murder at the hands of a youth the evils of our system begin

John R. Thompson has advertised that he will pay \$1,000 to any one who will give one good reason why the revolver manufacturing industry should be allowed to exist in America and enjoy the facilities of the mails. His \$1,000 is safer than the money the reader may have in his pocket at this moment. The revolver is designed primarily for the purpose of killing men It's only other use is the entertainment and afforded by target practice, A bow and arrow would serve as well for that purpose.

There is not a civilian in the United States who needs a revolver for any legitimate purpose except that of self-defense. If the footpad and potential murderer did not have a gun no honest citizen would need one even on the slight pretext of self-

The best single step possible toward reduction of crime in this country is to stop the manufacture of revolvers for any except military and police purposes. The sale ought to be stopped entirely. Every owner of a revolver is either a potential killer or the potential victim of some other killer. It is not fair to deprive one man of the chance of self-defense un less we deprive all men of the implement of murder. That can be done effectively by stopping the manufacture and sale of revolvers for all purposes except military and police.

Plenty of reasons may be offered to Mr. Tompson why the industry should be allowed to continue, but there will be no good reason.
