MAY CHARGE 3 CENTS ON NORTH SHORE LINE

"RATES DISCRIMINATORY" Commission Holds Intrastate Fares "Unduly Preferential;" Interstate Rate Not Affected

The Commission Wednesday held that the intrastate fares charged within the state of Illinois by the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad, operating an electric interurban line between Chicago and Milwaukee, are lower than the corresponding interstate fares charged by the company between points in Illinois and points in Wisconsin and are accordingly unduly preferential to persons and localities in intrastate commerce, and are unduly discriminatory against interstate commerce.

The effect of the above order, the officials of the company state, would be to raise the Illinois intrastate rate to three cents a mile to correspond with the interstate rate. In other words, it would simply put the rates upon the same plane. The effect locally would be slight as it is understood that it would not in any way affect the ten and twenty-five ride rates between local points and Chicago, which are now lower than two cents a mile. The majority of people locally will undoubtedly avail themselves of the advantage of the ten (10) and twenty-five (25) ride tickets on account of this new ruling. This does not mean any way effect the rate between Milwaukee and Chicago or between points in Illinois and points in Wisconsin.

BIG APPROPRIATION FOR THE UNIVERSITY

The \$10,500,000 University Appropriation Bill just passed by the senate, after having been unanimously approved by the State Legislature, will enable the University to again assume its place in the front rank of the State Educational Institutions of the Union. This means that \$5,250,000 exclusive of certain Federal grants for special purposes, will be expended in each of the next two years, for higher education, for technical training and for further accumulation of facts and information in every field of human knowledge which is at once put at the disposal of the people of the state through many agencies.
